Message from Mrs How and Mrs Daniels:

Welcome back to our first Star entry of 2024!

It has been a very busy first full week back and the children have demonstrated renewed energy and enthusiasm for their learning. The Spring term is the shortest in the school calendar but it is packed with new learning, special events and experiences for the children to look forward to including a Year 5 residential visit to Grafham Water, a Year 6 residential to the Peak District and a Rocksteady concert. Please note that the next opportunity to talk to class teachers at Parent Consultations is in the last week before the half term break. Coats, hats, scarves and gloves were needed this week due to the icy temperatures in the playground. Well done to the children who braved the weather this week to take part in an early morning run in Running Club and a netball match in the snow on Monday after school. We counted a few flakes! We spoke to the children in class and in assemblies this week about how to be responsible for themselves by looking after their belongings but how to look after the wider community in school by taking care of the school environment. ^{*} For sickness and/or diarrhea it is essential to keep your child away from school **until 48 hours after the last episode of diarrhoea/vomiting**. These sorts of bugs can be transmitted very easily, particularly in school settings. We do encourage lots of hand-washing in school and would ask you to follow this at home, as well. Please remember if your child is unwell they will be much more comfortable at home with a parent or carer who can look after them much more closely than we can in school.

News from Starling Class (Reception)

Happy New Year from Starling Class!

The children have all come back to school after their Christmas holidays well rested and eager to learn! We are so proud of how they have adapted to the changes and additions to our Spring timetable, taking it all in their stride.

In Phonics the children had a review of their Phase 3 learning this week whilst also learning the new digraph **oo**.

The children have been showing amazing resilience and persistence this week with their handwriting sessions. They have been working on their long ladder letter family this week and they will continue with this next week. When we talk about the letters during the handwriting sessions, we use the letter names e.g. t= tee. An information sheet has been sent home for you all so you can see how we teach the children how to form these letters so you can support at home with this too.

This week in Maths the children built on their prior knowledge of numbers to 5 and extended this to counting up to 8! The children met Numberblocks 6, 7 and 8, used a new resource a TEN FRAME which was very exciting!

We continued our 'word collecting' work this week with the following words below to build on our ambitious vocabulary.

<u>Word</u>	<u>Meaning</u>
Attempt	To make an effort to achieve or complete something
Nimble	Quick and light in movement or action
Nervous	Being worried and afraid about what might happen
Summit	The highest point of a hill or mountain

The children have enjoyed thinking about being a hero and what that means this week. The children have come to realise that not all heroes wear capes and can fly and that they themselves can be an 'Everyday hero' by being helpful to others. The children thought about the story of 'The snail and the whale' by Julia Donaldson and the numerous heroes that can be found within that story and why they felt they were heroes. We had a wonderful discussion about who helps them and how they can help others!



Next week the children will build on their learning from this week about heroes such as Police Officers, Doctors and Firefighters and will begin to think about superheroes! In Maths they will continue to build on their knowledge of numbers to 10 and in Phonics they will learn even more graphemes and Harder To Read and Spell words!

I would just like to say a little goodbye to you all and thank you. I feel privileged to have had the opportunity to settle all of your children into school life and start them on their learning journey. The children are an absolute credit to you all and I know the team and myself are grateful for all of your continued support at home. I cannot wait to see and hear how they flourish over the rest of the year. Mr Meridew and myself were absolutely blown away by your generosity and whilst never expected, it has been gratefully received so again a huge thank you.

News from Robin Class (Year 1)

What a lovely start to the new term we have had – thank you for all your support in getting bits and pieces ready for the next few weeks – sending toys in this week and gathering photos for Monday for us.

In Phonics, some of the children have been re-capping the following sounds:

ar	car, far, star	00	spoon, moon
ur	turn, surf	or	for, storm

Please make sure you find these sounds in your child's wallet and help them to create some words, or make up some words together for them to sound out and blend together. If you think your child is already confident with these sounds, please look at some of the harder to read and spell words in their words wallet and ensure they can read them all by sight.

Some children have looked at some new sounds:

ay (rather than ai)	treat, real	ou (rather than ow)	proud, mouth
ie (rather than igh)	pie, tie	ea (rather than ee)	treat, seal

The children who have learned these sounds have had them added to their sounds wallet – or they are in their reading book – please add to the sounds wallet you had last term. Do make some real and nonsense words, using all the sounds you have so far, to enable your child to practise decoding and blending using the new sounds. Weekly reading books should reflect the weeks learning, but sometimes only have a couple of words with target sounds in them.

Thank you for your continued assistance with helping your child learn to read – they (and we) really appreciate your help.



We have introduced the concept of 'History' to the children, which was fun, and have discussed some different ways we might be able to find out about how toys have changed through the years. Now, although we will attempt to build a 'time machine', please do be prepared to talk about how we might not actually get anywhere in it!

Last week in Art, the children were making collages using primary colours, inspired by the work of Piet Mondrian and his abstract compositions.

In PE we have begun to use the large equipment in the hall and we will build up to using the wall bars and climbing ropes over the next few weeks. The children were all very enthusiastic, careful and controlled using body shapes, rolls and travelling using the benches this week.

Once again, we are also very grateful for the lovely, generous gifts you sent in for us for Christmas – thank you!

Assemblies & Collective Worship

In Monday's assembly we talked about the arrival of the Wise Men at the birth of Jesus and the celebration of this event (Epiphany) on 6th January. Although traditional Nativity scenes and stories place them in the stable with the shepherds and the Holy Family, evidence suggests that they arrived some time later.

We thought about how the first visitors being poor shepherds and rich 'kings' reflected the key message that the teachings of the Bible are for all, no matter what our background or status is. We also thought about how they brought gifts for the baby Jesus and how we could use our gifts such as kindness, tolerance and bravery to help others.

News from Owl Class (Year 2)

Happy New Year and welcome back to a cold start this spring term. It has been a busy week; meeting Mrs Polito on Monday, seeing the world from an aerial view in geography, experimenting with Andy Warhol styles in art and starting new spelling lessons as well as so much more.

In Maths the children have started to learn about money; looking at pence then pounds, exploring finding the same amount in different ways and how to count money efficiently. Any money play at home working on recognising coin and note values, adding up to a set amount or finding a given amount another way would really benefit your child. We will end the week by comparing amounts of money using the inequality symbols. <> = In English the children have been reading lots of information texts this week, mostly about London to support our new topic for the half term; 'All the way to Buckingham Palace.' By the end of the unit the children will know the features of an information text, how to use them and will include them when writing their own London tourist leaflet. Any interesting facts you may know about London and can share with us would be greatly appreciated.

In Science this week the children have been exploring seeking patterns to start off our new learning block; materials. The experiment to find the bounciest material was great fun and lots of new vocabulary was learnt. Do you know what a golf ball is made from? *Compressed rubber and resin.*





In phonics we have been reviewing the alternative spellings for the 'ai' sound. Please see below and practise at home recognising the phonemes as 'ai'

ai: rain ay: play a-e: bake ey: grey ea: great eigh: weight a: table

In spellings this week we have been learning the alternative spellings for the 'j' sound. **-dge -ge-g** Please support your child at home to learn their spellings.

News from Peacock Class (Year 3)

Welcome back, I hope you have all had a restful and enjoyable Christmas and a positive start to the New Year.

The children all returned last week with renewed enthusiasm and enjoyed a short week immersed in all things French. Over the two days, the children found out about some famous people from French history, eg Louis Braille, the Montgolfier brothers and Degas. They also found out about the geography of France by locating famous landmarks and regions in France on a map. In addition, we have found out a little about some French foods, and further developed our French vocabulary.

In Maths, we continued our work on multiplication and division. This week we have focussed on multiplying and dividing by 10. We worked on understanding what happens when multiplying by 10, and how to multiply a 2 digit number by 10. Next week we will continue with more multiplication and division work.

Our first full week back was all about the science of rocks and soils! We found out about how the three different types of rocks are formed, where we can see them, what they look like, their properties and how they can be used. We also found out about how fossils are made and discovered.

The science of soil made our brains hurt! Did you know there are more different living things in soil than there are on land? Also, there are more living things in one teaspoon of soil than all the humans on earth! We carried out an investigation into types of soil and filtration, investigated the properties of different soil types and created our own soil organism describing what job they did and what type of soil they would live in.

News from Swift Class (Year 4)

This week we began work on our new topic that explores a cross curricular topic titled 'Imagine, Inspire, Influence'. This topic has an Art and Design and Technology focus, which allows us to look at present day advances in technology that affect our lives today and in the future. We will be learning about inspiring innovators, inventors, artists, architects, designers and painters. As well as looking at their many achievements, we will be considering how they dealt with pitfalls and difficulties. We will be able to reflect on their resilience and use some of their behaviours in our own work.

In our maths lessons, we have been exploring how to accurately measure incorporating this into problem solving activities. We have been applying our knowledge of Chinese numbers and producing longer sentences by creating days and months. For example in Chinese the 13^{th} January is written as. $-\beta + \Xi \Box$. As part of our Geography lessons, we have begun to explore the countries of Europe and revisited where to find the names of the world's major oceans from previous years.

News from Heron Class (Year 5)


Welcome back to your first Star entry of 2024! We hope you had a restful and enjoyable

Christmas break and have started 2024 on a positive note. In class, we have certainly not hesitated to jump straight back into our learning across the curriculum.

In Maths, we have been working on fractions – adding to and subtracting from mixed numbers, including crossing and breaking the whole.

In English, we have started to look at science fiction texts. We have discussed and justified our opinions

about whether or not we believe there is life on other planets and then we started to identify the features of a science fiction text.



In History we shared what we already know about the Roman invasion of Britain (quite a lot it turns out which is great). 'Horrible Histories' featured in our discussions which lead to an interesting discussion about primary and secondary sources of evidence. We looked at maps to explore the scale of the Roman Empire and shared facts about the might of the Roman Army!

In PE we demonstrated great control in our first hockey lesson of the term. We took care with our push shots and stops and navigated our way around Mrs Weddepohl's challenging circuit to show off our dribbling skills. We did all of this very enthusiastically despite the icy temperatures.

Please can you ensure that PE Kits are in school all week and should include the following in a named bag:

– shorts, T-shirt, jogging bottoms, sweatshirt (no hoodies please), spare socks, trainers. Stud earrings need to be taped before the lesson but ideally they should not be worn on PE days. Many thanks for your support with this.

In PSHE, we considered how other people's perceptions, views and stereotypes influence our own sense of identity.

News from Puffin Class (Year 6)

I hope everyone had a restful festive period and are raring to go for the new term and year ahead.

In English we have started to look at non-chronological reports. We wrote our cold text about a strange looking animal, and then we looked at the features of the genre, including studying some geographical features such as hurricanes and earthquakes. Next week we will be researching about the sinking of the Titanic and will be looking at the planning of non-chronological reports.

This week, in Maths, we have been continuing our work on fractions. Firstly, we concentrated on adding and subtracting fractions. A key point to remember here is that when adding and subtracting fractions the denominator stays the same – it is the numerator that is changed. We then focussed on multiplying and dividing fractions. Strangely, the class really enjoyed multiplying fractions!

We also examined the differences between mixed number fractions and improper fractions; how we can convert between these and simplify the answers too. Ask your child about multiplying and dividing fractions; there are a few stages to go through. (See the above example.) Ask your child about what the difference is between mixed numbers, proper fractions and improper fractions.

Last week the class designed and made World War One trenches from shoeboxes (thank you for all the donated shoeboxes, by the way) as part of their DT project. It was an enjoyable and educational day – attached are some photos of the boxes in the building process.

Homework will be set again this Friday and should be completed by Thursday 18th January.


