

A new mental health FREE text messaging support service

We all know the importance of supporting people when they struggle with their mental health – most of us will have some sort of experience of mental health difficulties, either ourselves or in friends and family.

We have been asked to share the following information with our school community – please if you know of anyone who would benefit from knowing about this service pass on the information below. The message is clear – if we SHOUT when we need help, someone will HEAR.



A new local mental health free text messaging support service launched across Cambridgeshire and Peterborough on Monday 13 November.

HEAR 85258 is being funded by NHS Cambridgeshire & Peterborough, in partnership with the national service SHOUT. The free to use text service provides real-time support to people who are struggling with their mental health across the county.

When texting the word **HEAR** to **85258**, the person will be connected to a trained volunteer who will offer them calm in a time or place of crisis. During the confidential and anonymous conversation, the texter will be supported while working on a plan of action and signposted to local and national mental health services.

Texting HEAR to 85258 is free, discreet and runs 24/7. It won't appear on a mobile bill and requires no app, data, password, or registration.






Assemblies & Collective Worship

In D&T, the children used all the skills they have learned in joining paper, using tabs, flanges, slit joints and zig-zag folding. They created their own 'island' using as many new skills as they could.

News from Owl Class (Year 2)

What a week I am so incredibly proud of all the Owls for remembering their lines, action cues and songs to perform three fantastic nativity shows. I hope all the families who managed to attend felt the same way and enjoyed it as much as we have enjoyed making it happen.

It has also been a busy week with new topics of learning in English and Maths, learning a Christmas song in Spanish and making moving Christmas decorations for our Design Technology project.

In Maths the children have started to learn about shape, both 2D and 3D and have spent lots of time with concrete resources manipulating them to find shape properties, learning how to accurately count sides and vertices and finding efficient methods so no mistakes are made. The children have also learnt how to draw 2D shapes with accuracy (a ruler!) and extended to look at what is a line of symmetry and how can I use one to complete a shape.

In English the children have been reading lots of recipes and 'how to...' texts.

From the list of features, do you know our new text type? Talk it through with your child for help. (Answer at bottom of features list)

- > Title
- > Present tense
- > Chronological order
- > Time connectives
- > Bullet points or numbering to separate steps
- > Imperative verbs

Answer: Instructions

During the week the children have found the features in different examples of our text type and then defined the features. Once we knew what the features were the children have practised being bossy to create a word bank of imperative verbs.

Cut, whisk, glue, fold, mix, tie, clip, put, stick, clean, bend, tear, add, paint.

I am sure your child would love to keep the performing spirit alive and share the song Feliz Navidad with you. The song has started each day for us this week and the enthusiasm and energy the children have singing it is infectious.

Our design and technology project this term was within the element of 'mechanisms and control.' The children have made a moving Christmas decoration, we hope not to have a spoiler in the star so I will not share too much more but it was great fun and the children all achieved something they didn't think was possible to start with. We love the phrase 'I can't do this... YET!'

News from Peacock Class (Year 3)

In English this week, we have put together all our descriptive skills to write a descriptive passage for the chocolate room. We thought carefully about sentence openers, prepositions, adjectives, expanded noun phrases, similes and the use of all our senses to help us with our texts. We are all very proud of what we have achieved, as when we started the unit on descriptive writing it seemed rather daunting, but we have all achieved work we can be proud of.

News from Swift Class (Year 4)

Over the last two weeks, Swift Class has been learning about changes in state. To help us do this we have carried out a number of experiments such as making ice cream, moving liquids and creating different gasses through chemical reactions. We have also been concentrating on improving the precision of our scientific diagrams so they are easy to understand.

We made our delicious mooncakes (月饼) which involved much kneading, mixing, stirring, folding, boiling, and moulding! Next week we will be improving our chopping technique when we make another traditional Chinese dish. Our Design and Technology work will also see us learning about how textiles can be used to create useful items. This sits alongside our work in art, where we are exploring how textiles are used in weaving to create artistic works.

In case you missed it in church, here is a picture of Year 4's Christmas tree that appeared alongside others from the community at the Christmas Tree Festival.

Last week, half the class took part in the Wimpole cross-country run alongside 23 other schools. We were impressed with the children's resolve to try their best.

We have enjoyed watching KS1 rehearsal for their Christmas Production and we are looking forward to KS2's Christmas service, which takes place not just once but twice next Thursday; once in the morning and once in the evening.

News from Puffin Class (Year 6)

This week, we have finished working through old SATs papers. The children have worked hard and now have a feel of what all the SATs exams will be like in mid –May next year. They are becoming familiar with the types of questions that appear, as well as how quickly they should work and how the questions should be answered. We will be working through the answers, and methods to get to the answers in some of these tests next week.

In Maths lessons we have continued to look at fractions. We have been adding and subtracting fractions, then converting between mixed numbers and improper fractions. We shall look at multiplying and dividing fractions and converting between decimals and percentages over the next few lessons.



In English, we have continued to study 'A Midsummer Night's Dream'. After looking at some of the main characters from the play and focussing on improving a descriptive paragraph about one of them, we are in the process of planning, writing and editing a critical evaluation of an animated film of the play. Some of the children enjoyed the play a lot, and they are beginning to understand the humour and language used by Shakespeare.



We have also been working hard in class on our contribution to the KS2 Christmas service, which is due to take place in the church next week.

Homework should be completed by Thursday 14th December – thank you. Keep on reading and learning those times tables too please.
