Message from Mrs How and Mrs Daniels:

Next week we will be marking **World Book Day** (see page 10 for more details). This year we are taking a slightly different approach and asking children to focus more on actual books and their favourite book characters rather than choosing their costumes or simply wearing non-uniform clothes. In recent years, we have seen a shift towards costumes based on film and TV based characters which does not feel quite in keeping with the WBD theme of promoting a love of books and reading for pleasure. We know that for some parents, not having to source or create a costume will come as a relief and others may be disappointed but as always we like to try new things and will review afterwards to decide on future plans and events. Please help your child to select their favourite book and choose an item to bring in next Friday that can be used as a clue for others to guess the title and author.

Over the last few weeks, we have noticed an increasing number of children on the playground after school climbing on the playstructure, the gazebo/quiet area and generally running around away from their parents and carers. As you will be aware, the school playground is a busy place after school and all the gates are open to allow access and exit. Please keep your children (school age and pre-schoolers) close to you when waiting in the playground so that staff can clearly see which children are with which adult and we can be confident that everyone has been safely collected and taken home. We also ask that children do not use the playstructure, trimtrail etc. after school hours as they are not under school staff supervision and therefore not covered by our insurance should there be an accident.

This week the volunteers from GenR8 have updated our school **Prayer / Reflection space** with a focus on the period of Lent. This has been a theme in recent assemblies and we are using the annual Bishop of Ely's *Lent Challenge* to help children make connections between the Christian period of Lent and their lives today. As part of the display there is a daily challenge to inspire the children to treat others as they would like to be treated (paraphrased from Luke 6 v 31). Please see a copy of this on page 20, perhaps you would like to try this with your family in the build up to Easter.



^{*} For sickness and/or diarrhea it is essential to keep your child away from school **until 48 hours after the last episode of diarrhoea/vomiting**. These sorts of bugs can be transmitted very easily, particularly in school settings. We do encourage lots of hand-washing in school and would ask you to follow this at home, as well. Please remember if your child is unwell they will be much more comfortable at home with a parent or carer who can look after them much more closely than we can in school.

Covid-19 - Current advice is that this should be treated as any other respiratory infection. The following is from <u>People with symptoms of a respiratory infection including COVID-19 - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)</u>

Symptoms of respiratory infections, including COVID-19

Respiratory infections can spread easily between people. It is important to be aware of symptoms so you can take action to reduce the risk of spreading your infection to other people.

The symptoms of COVID-19 and other respiratory infections are very similar. It is not possible to tell if you have COVID-19, flu or another respiratory infection based on symptoms alone. Most people with COVID-19 and other respiratory infections will have a relatively mild illness, especially if they have been vaccinated.

If you have symptoms of a respiratory infection, such as COVID-19, and you have a high temperature or you do not feel well enough to go to work or carry out normal activities, you are advised to try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people.

Symptoms of COVID-19, flu and common respiratory infections include:

- continuous cough
- high temperature, fever or chills
- loss of, or change in, your normal sense of taste or smell
- shortness of breath
- unexplained tiredness, lack of energy
- muscle aches or pains that are not due to exercise
- not wanting to eat or not feeling hungry
- headache that is unusual or longer lasting than usual
- sore throat, stuffy or runny nose
- diarrhoea, feeling sick or being sick

Message from South Cambs District Council

Parking enforcement changes - please think about where you park

From 1 February anyone parking on restrictions such as double yellow lines or zig zag lines near the school are far more likely to receive a parking ticket than before.

Cambridgeshire County Council was given Civil Parking Enforcement powers by the Government late last year and are doing a final push with South Cambridgeshire District Council to remind people of the change before tickets, with fines attached, begin to be issued by Civil Parking Enforcement Officers.

The safety of pupils and everyone in and around the school is really important and inconsiderate parking can make it more dangerous for people. Please use this change as an additional reminder to think about where you park.

In the past only the Police could issue tickets for illegal parking, but the changes mean it is now a civil matter and Council Civil Parking Enforcement Officers can issue the tickets for some matters.

News from Starling Class (Reception)

We have all been so impressed with how well the children have settled back into school after their half term break. This week we have been busy learning about Traditional Tales. The children explored the story 'The Gingerbread Man' by creating a story map and sequencing the story using pictures and words. They investigated which materials would make the best bridge for the Gingerbread Man in their Science lesson. The children also enjoyed making salt dough gingerbread men.

In Phonics the children had a review of their Phase 3 learning this week whilst also learning the new harder to read and spell words, 'said, 'so' and 'have.'

In Handwriting we have been practising the letter 's.' When we talk about the letters during handwriting sessions, we use the letter names, eg, t=tee.

We continued our 'word collecting' work this week with the following words below to build on our ambitious vocabulary.

In our PE session we have started a new topic of games and this week the children were using bean bags, hoops and spots to learn about navigating the space. Our PE day is Tuesday now and so the children will be able to get changed after lunch.

The children are really excited about bringing 'Button' the bear home with them again after his half term break. Please encourage the children to draw a picture or take a photo showing their family and Button involved in everyday activities. We look forward to hearing about his adventures! Please could we have any boxes, plastic bottles, yoghurt pots etc to be used for junk modelling next week. Many thanks for your support with this.




News from Robin Class (Year 1)


We have had a great first week back from our half term break. The children have all enjoyed our Phonics and Reading sessions, with great improvements in my particular group's reading as they have grown in confidence and ability with reading the same book all week. Hopefully you will notice the difference in their ability, too! Please do keep up reading this book each day to try to add in expression which will help your child sound less like a robot - constantly sounding out - because they know what they are reading.

In Maths, we have been concentrating on subtracting. The children know this is the same as saying 'minus' or 'take away'. They are really starting to get the hang of relating facts they already know to the calculation they might be trying to work out. For example, 17 - 4 =

If I know that 7 - 4 is 3,


then I now that 17 - 4 = 13





In the same way, if I know that 5 - 5 = 0, then I know that 15 - 5 = 10

If I can see that 12 is made of 10 and 2, and I am trying to subtract 7, I can see that I can cross out the whole 'top line' on these 10-frames, because 7 is made using 5 + 2:





and that I am then left with 5!

I know that 6 is made of 3 and 3. Completing the calculation 13 - 6, I can take 3 from 13 to make 10 and another 3 from 10, to make 7 (because I know that 3 + 7 = 10; 7 + 3 = 10 and 10 - 3 = 7)

We have also used number lines to 'count back' when subtracting, as well as 'find the difference' by using the 'Gracie' method, of making 2 equal towers of cubes – this was a popular method, thanks to our very own Gracie for suggesting it!!

As part of our History lesson, the children enjoyed seeing a Zoetrope (just a home-made version!) and had a great time creating, testing and in some cases altering their own



designs to put into the zoetrope to see their own 'moving pictures'. It was such a joy to see their little faces light up to see their own creations.

Phonics:

There are a few groups, so do check in with your child about what they have been learning this week, and check if there are new sounds to practise in book bags.

'al' saying 'or'	as in walk and chalk
'y' saying 'ee'	as in lolly and nanny

OR

oy, saying 'oi'	as in toy; joy	ir, saying 'er' / 'ur'	as in thirst; shirt
ue, saying 'oo'	as in blue; glue	aw, saying 'or'	as in jaw;

Assemblies & Collective Worship

In Monday's assembly we looked at the first of Bishop Dagmar's Lent Challenges (Bishop Dagmar Winter is the Bishop of Huntingdon and she is currently also serving as Acting Bishop of Ely). The focus of the assembly was flooding, comparing some of the recent issues locally and globally with the story of Noah's Ark in the book of Genesis (in Genesis the flood was sent by God, today many floods are caused by human actions). The challenge this week is for children to think carefully about how they use water and try to reduce usage where they can such as turning off the tap whilst brushing their teeth or only pouring as much water as they are going to drink.

News from Owl Class (Year 2)

We have been so impressed with how the children in Owl class have settled back into their routines and learning this week. In Computing, we have been continuing to learn about algorithms. We know that an algorithm is a precise set of ordered instructions, which can be turned into code. We created our own mats for the beebots to travel round and we also added in some obstacles.



In English, we have started a new unit all about the author Julia Donaldson. We have used what we know to ask questions and make statements. We watched a video about her and we also read her biography. Did you know that she has written 46 plays?

In Maths, we are continuing to work hard with division. We are getting much more confident at dividing by five and we are starting to use arrays with more success. Do you know what an array is? If not, why not ask your Owl to explain.

In RE, we have begun with our new BIG question 'Why does Easter matter to Christians?' We have spent some time ordering the events during Holy Week and we will look at the signs and symbols of Easter. What do you think of when you hear the word Easter?

Spanish this week has seen us reminding ourselves of lots of classroom objects. We are starting to remember where some of these words are stuck around the classroom to help us. Our focus is on 'La Clase' which translates as 'The Classroom'

News from Peacock Class (Year 3)

We have returned with the same hard working approach as before half term, only this week with more enthusiasm as we are not quite so jaded following the half term's rest.

This week we have continued our unit of maths work on length and perimeter. On Tuesday we focussed on converting measurements between cm and mm, using our understanding of dividing and multiplying by 10 to help. We further developed our equivalent work by converting between cm, m and mm. Other measuring work involved addition of lengths and finding the difference between lengths to work out how much shorter or longer items were than each other.

Measurement and length will continue again next week.



We had a go at this challenge, the children thought it would be fun for you to have a go at home!

In English, we finished working on our instructions to mummify a body. We reminded ourselves about the importance of instructions being clear, in the correct order and containing imperative verbs. To add to these essentials, we added adverbs, and additional details. Can you spot these things in the instruction extract below?

The next step is disgusting; the removal of the brain through the nose. Force the hook up the nose to fragment the brain; (if you are squeamish, you may want to get a friend to do it for you). After that, carefully scoop the brain out and discard.

In topic work, we have looked at the Egyptian gods and there are many. There are gods for gods, some gods have two names, some gods have two identities, and some gods come back to life before becoming another god. We have had to think carefully and focus so that we do not become too muddled. To help us be sure about our god facts we have each chosen just four gods to gather information on from a variety of sources, therefore we have needed to use all of our research skills. Once our research had been collected, we started work on our 'lift the flap 'charts about our gods.

In PSHE we have continued to think about relationships with friends and family by considering how friends and family can help each other to feel safe and secure even when things are tough.

In RE we moved onto Hinduism and began to explore the next Big Question – Why does a Hindu want to collect good Karma?

Our adopted donkey is happy in the early Spring sunshine, and sent us a Valentine's card with a little news from his friends.

News from Swift Class (Year 4)

I hope you had an enjoyable and restful break. We have enjoyed hearing about what everybody got up to.

In our Maths lessons this week, we have embarked on a new topic - time. Although analogue clocks are not as prevalent as they once were, it is still important for the children to understand how to read them alongside their digital counterparts. If you are able to reinforce this learning at home, perhaps by regularly discussing the time using both analogue and digital clocks, that would be helpful – especially the concepts of 'quarter to' and 'twenty to'.

In our English lessons, we have continued our work on biographical writing. Specifically, by looking at the books of Marcus Rashford and how he describes how he overcame obstacles to achieve his goals, we hope to inspire our students to develop their own perseverance! We will also be looking at other inspiring people over the next few days.

In Science, alongside electrical safety, our focus has been on circuits and the properties of conductors and non-conductors. We have been carrying out practical experiments to explore the flow of electricity and identify materials that facilitate or hinder its passage. To reinforce this learning, you could encourage your child to identify objects around the house that are conductors or non-conductors and discuss why this is so.

In our PE work we are concluding our work on balance and will be focusing on the sport of ultimate frisbee, which requires different throwing techniques beyond the commonly known back hand. The game also requires good special awareness.

News from Heron Class (Year 5)

This week in Maths, we have returned to our next block of work on fractions. We have decided to interpret the sounds that your children made when they discovered this as expressions of delight! We began by multiplying unit and non-unit fractions by integers and then moved onto calculating fractions of an amount. Everyone has done really well with these questions and we have seen some very proud faces during our maths lessons this week.

In English this week, we have begun work on our next genre, which is myths. We have spent some time studying the story of Romulus and Remus and understanding how the structure of a myth compares with the typical 'story mountain' approach to writing that we are used to seeing. We also looked at myth writing in our guided reading session this week. Finally, a few quick reminders about our trip to Grafham Water next week.

- Please remember to send in a packed lunch and a reusable water bottle (full) for Wednesday. No need for snacks, the centre will provide these.
- Please send your child to school on Wednesday in their outdoor clothes rather than school uniform ready to take part in an activity as soon as they arrive at the residential centre.
- Children may bring one bag/suitcase with them that they can carry themselves and it must not contain electrical items of any kind or any food. Please leave these by the wall to the left of the staff car park when you arrive at school.
- Lots of old clothes please and a black bin liner to put them into as your child takes them off they may be wet or dirty or both! No jewellery but plenty of hair bands please to tie long hair back and keep it away from safety ropes and harnesses.



- A favourite ted/comforter a must!
- If your child is catching the bus to school on Wednesday an adult will be there to help them get their bag off the bus.
- Children will register as usual and then we will leave on the coach, you are welcome to stay to wave us off if you wish but we understand that this may not work for everyone.

News from Puffin Class (Year 6)

In English, we are continuing with our topic on persuasive writing. We have focussed on using emotive language, and the differences between fact and opinion and how sometimes opinion can be 'dressed up' as facts. We have also examined modal verbs – ask your child about what they are and how they can be used in persuasive writing. Finally, we looked at the differences between formal and informal writing and the children wrote two pieces based on the same headline both formally and informally.

This week, in Maths, we have continued to look at equations and formulae in algebra. Algebra is about replacing numbers with letters and thinking about how a formula could work to solve problems. Many found this challenging but persevered well. We will continue with looking at linear number sequences next week.

In PE this week we have finished our session on football. As you can imagine most enjoyed this topic – here are a few photos of the mini-matches that the children played on Wednesday.

The children are looking forward to the residential trip and we hope the weather will be ok. A reminder that if your child needs medication please bring this in, with the completed form, on Monday (11th March) morning and hand it in to Mrs Weddepohl or Mrs Barbour please. 
