A new mental health FREE text messaging support service

We all know the importance of supporting people when they struggle with their mental health – most of us will have some sort of experience of mental health difficulties, either ourselves or in friends and family.

We have been asked to share the following inormation with our school community – please if you know of anyone who would benefit from knowing about this service pass on the information below. The message is clear – if we SHOUT when we need help, someone will HEAR.





A new local mental health free text messaging support service launched across Cambridgeshire and Peterborough on Monday 13 November.

HEAR 85258 is being funded by NHS Cambridgeshire & Peterborough, in partnership with the national service SHOUT. The free to use text service provides real-time support to people who are struggling with their mental health across the county.

When texting the word **HEAR** to **85258**, the person will be connected to a trained volunteer who will offer them calm in a time or place of crisis. During the confidential and anonymous conversation, the texter will be supported while working on a plan of action and signposted to local and national mental health services.

Texting HEAR to 85258 is free, discreet and runs 24/7. It won't appear on a mobile bill and requires no app, data, password, or registration.

Rules for entry

This year entry is online at https://data.opentrack.run/en-gb/x/2024/GBR/camxc/ . There are no paper entries.

Closing date for entries - 23.59 on 31 December 2023

The person(s) completing the entry will be responsible for entries being correct. Incorrect entries may lead to disqualification on the day.

NO LATE ENTRIES OR ENTRIES ON THE DAY – you can check that you are entered by looking on the list of entries at https://entries.opentrack.run/2024/camxc/

Entry fees: £5.00.

Unattached Senior and Vet athletes to pay a £2 additional levy - non-payment will result in exclusion from the event results.

Check carefully – No athlete shall join a cross-country race into which they are not qualified (eligible) to compete. Athletes infringing this rule shall be liable to expulsion from any race under the jurisdiction of UK Athletics and could also render their club liable to disqualification. Athletes aged 11 and above should ideally (but not essentially) be registered (URN) with England Athletics.

Club Vests - The correct club vest must be worn; otherwise individuals (and teams) may be disqualified.

Awards – Cambridgeshire AA medals will be awarded to the first three individuals and the first three teams in each **age group**, including under 11's

Athletes - all athletes must have eligibility to compete in the Cambridgeshire Championships either by birth, residence or armed forces as per UKA rules. Athletes may not compete in the championships of, or represent, more than one County during the competition year. England athletics registration is not a condition of entry, but if you have an EA registration number,

please quote it. It may make your registration process faster.

An entrant shall be deemed to have made him/herself/their self, familiar with, and agreed to be bound by the UKA Anti-Doping Rules and to submit to the authority of UK Anti-Doping in the application and enforcement of the Anti-Doping Rules. The UKA Anti-Doping Rules apply to entrants participating in the sport of Athletics, for 12 months from the [date of entry], whether or not the licence holder is a citizen of, or resident in, the UK.'

Teams

Only teams from clubs affiliated to Cambs AA are eligible for team medals. (2023/24 year affiliation applies)

Senior men - The first 6 to score. The senior team can comprise of seniors, vets and under 20's. (The first 6 to finish score for team 'A', if the team consists of 6 or more; the next 6 constitutes team 'B' and so on).

Senior women - The first 3 to score. The senior team can comprise of seniors, vets and under 20's. (The first 3 to finish score for team 'A', if the team consists of 3 or more; the next 3 constitutes team 'B' and so on).

All other age groups - 3 to score (the first three to finish score for team 'A', if the team consists of 3 or more; the next three constitutes team 'B' and so on.

Masters teams can be comprised of runners from any veteran category.

All athletes qualifying for a club team must be either 1st claim members of that club, or 2nd claim members of that club if their first claim club was not affiliated to Cambridgeshire AA in 2023/24.

Numbers - Will be issued to club representatives at the event registration on the day.

First Aid – Qualified first aiders will be in attendance. **Changing** – Pavilion in Priory Park.

Parking – Please park in Almond road, which is adjacent to Priory Park. (PE19 1DZ) Please do not park in the local housing estates as this causes complaints from local residents. Additional parking has been arranged at Longsands school.

Age groups - as specified in the UK Athletics Rules.

Age groups are based on the athlete's age as on 31st August 2023 for all age-groups except Masters.

The Under 13 age group shall be confined to competitors who were aged 11 or 12 on 31^{st} of August 2023

Under 11's must be aged at least 8, 9 or 10 on the day of competition.

News from Starling Class (Reception)

Hello for the final time this term from Starling Class!

This week the children have had another topsy turvy week with my absence which I apologise about ('tis the season for all the bugs) but I am reliably informed that the children have been in the very capable hands of Mrs Brown, Mrs Keech and Mrs Bowmer, so I know that they have been having a wonderful time preparing for festive times ahead!

This week we completed our Week 5 assessments in Phonics and have sent home a red revision card highlighting your child's gaps as we did last half term (last half term was on cream). The green highlighted sections shows any gaps from last half term which they still need to work on and the orange highlight is this half terms gaps to focus on. The reading books have been collected this week, so please make any homework which you choose to do over the Christmas break is focusing on the gaps on the red revision cards. The GPC sections are where the children were shown a letter and they needed to say the sound that letter makes in line with our Phonics programme, HRSW sections are the Harder To Read and Spell words which the children should be able to recognise on sight rather than try to segment them into their separate sounds as they are tricky words e.g. go if segmented g-o = goh, instead they should see the whole word and read it as such. The final sections are the Words sections, these are words which your child should be able to segment and blend back together to read e.g. less = l-e-ss, less, you will most likely see your child using their robot arms and blending hands to support them with this.

Next week we have Christmas cheer in abundance to celebrate our final three days of the Autumn Term starting with our Polar Express Day! Don't forget your pyjamas and soft cuddly comfy things to get cosy with in the afternoon. On Tuesday, the children will be back in their school uniforms, have a festive dance party, a special visitor from the North Pole will be dropping by and have an afternoon of games and puzzles. On Wednesday the children will be in their Christmas jumpers, visit the Church for an end of term special Christmas service, play Mrs Meridew's favourite game ... Christmas bingo, finish off their Christmas crafts and say goodbye to Twinkle the class Elf.

We thank you for all of your support at home and during this very busy Half Term. The children have done you all proud during their first ever term at school and are making great strides with their progress. The individual sound cards can be used to create real or nonsense words (by your child OR you) to sound out and blend together. The children really should know ALL the sounds in their bags. Words should be read on sight by now. If you're not sure, please check!

We started Monday with our Elf Day. Hopefully you will have heard all about the jobs we all tried out, with the aim of asking Father Christmas if we could help him out as a Special Elf. The children enjoyed mixing reindeer food, and placing it in a special bag. They needed to think not just about the mix of ingredients, but also keeping their workstation clean and tidy (and sweeping up any spillages). They also had the opportunity to try their hand at wrapping a gift. Some children were amazing at this! After wrapping a 'gift' they needed to see if their writing and decorating was good enough to be Chief Label-Writer. We have some beautiful writing demonstrated. Another of the jobs was seeing how good they were at creating new toys, using the wooden blocks and Kapla. Some of your children have wonderful imaginations! The fifth job was printing their own wrapping paper – which will come home for you to admire (and hopefully use) next week!

After completing an 'elf evaluation sheet' to decide which were our favourite jobs (and which ones we were actually good at), there was excitement and enthusiasm in writing a letter to Father Christmas. This was Tuesday's job and all the children tried to <u>persuade</u> Father Christmas that we were good enough to do our favourite jobs. We added a picture of ourselves in an elf hat to show how good we look in red and green, too!

On Wednesday, we managed a Maths morning, thinking about subtraction using 'fact families'. Some of the children managed to complete EIGHT number sentences using a 'fact family' of 3 numbers.

Thursday saw us visiting the church to enjoy Key Stage 2's special church service, and we were able to join in with some of the songs with great gusto! Then, back to school for another Maths lesson before a delicious Christmas dinner.



This morning (Friday) we were entertained by all the Rocksteady bands performing to the school, before their concert to parents this afternoon. We were all impressed by the singing and playing! News from Puffin Class (Year 6)

As well as all the Christmas activities, we have still been working on Maths and English lessons. In Maths, we have continued to look at fractions. We have been adding and subtracting fractions, then converting between mixed numbers and improper fractions. We shall look at multiplying and dividing fractions and converting between decimals and percentages next term.

In English, our new topic is focussed on poems from the Great War and the impact they had on both individuals and society as a whole. We read and discussed poems from Thomas Hardy, Rudyard Kipling and Rupert Brooke. Although the poems were challenging, the children gained a lot from analysing the language, effect and structure of the three poems. The ultimate aim is for the children to write their own poem based on some of the poems that they have read, and to look at the language and different poetic features that they could use to impact on the reader. Our aim is to finish this topic before Christmas.

No homework will be officially set for over the Christmas period, however encourage your children to keep on reading and learning their times tables and mental maths skills. Next term we will be looking at non-chronological reports in English lessons and continuing with fractions in Maths.


