Message from Mrs How:

Assembly today was a sea of red, white and blue with children and staff sporting the colours of the Union Flag in celebration of King Charles' coronation tomorrow. We talked about the coronation, with many children demonstrating good knowledge of key information. They know that the coronation is not the point at which Charles becomes King – that happened "the second his mum died", and they know how the line of succession works. Trying to help them understand the historic relevance of the event is a little harder, especially for our youngest children. No one in school has witnessed the coronation of our monarch but if you are only five and so many things are new it is perhaps less significant. What is even stranger is that most of us are likely to witness at least one more coronation in our lifetime.

The children were asked to think about how King Charles would be feeling about tomorrow's events. Responses ranged from "excited because he will be crowned" and "nervous because so many people will be watching and he might do something wrong" to "sad because he has got to get up early" and "melancholy because he will be reminded of his mum, the Queen". Asking children to imagine how someone else might be feeling is something we do a lot in school, and it is a brilliant way to encourage them to think about what they have heard or read. Even if your child is a strong reader, asking them to consider the feelings and emotions of characters in the book at various points will help deepen their understanding, improve their skills in making inferences, develop language skills and ultimately improve their skills as a writer. It only takes a few moments but will have a massive impact.

As I write this, the view from my office window is of an overcast sky and rain running off the roofs. As a result, some of the outdoor activities planned for the children today have had to be changed or abandoned. I will be keeping my fingers crossed over the weekend that the rain holds off and that whatever you are doing, whether joining in coronation celebrations or spending time with your families you have an enjoyable Bank holiday weekend.



News from Starling Class (Reception)

Hello from Starling Class,

What an exciting week we have had! On Wednesday, we had our annual class trip to Standalone Farm where we got to experience farm life by brushing the ponies, feeding the pigs and stroking the donkeys. We also spotted lots of other animals including sheep (and lambs), alpacas, cows, horses, geese and goats as well as rabbits and a degu! The children were really well behaved and did lots of walking and learning! We especially enjoyed the woodland walk where we found fairy doors and gnomes amongst the wild woods.

On Thursday, we spent our day thinking about our trip to the farm writing sentences about all

of the fascinating things we experienced – the bus being a number of the children's favourite part of the day! We recapped identifying farm animals and matching them to their babies. On Friday, we celebrated King Charles' Coronation by taking part in a whole school art project creating the Union Jack flag using a multitude of materials. The children chose red, white and blue media and materials to create our 'parts' of the flag.

Next week, we will be reviewing the historic coronation and discuss what we all got up to in order to mark the celebration. We too will be looking at the growing of plants and learn about the Eurovision song contest as well as counting beyond 10, including meeting the new Number Blocks. We will continue our recap of Phase 3 phonics through playing games and practising letter formation.


It was great to think about tomorrow's Coronation of King Charles III in our assembly and lessons today, with the children completing some arty, crafty pieces ready for a whole school display.



News from Owl Class (Year 2)

We have all had a busy week and it has been lovely to see the children outside using the field again at break times and enjoying the sunshine.





In our English lessons, we have continued to look at the features of non-fiction texts. We used our research from last week to go on to write our own 'Seahorse Fact Files' and you can see three examples of them above. In Year 2, we learn about different types of sentences such as statements, questions and exclamations, which our fact files gave us the opportunity to use. We also learn about using adjectives to add more detailed description to our writing, and this week we practised including an expanded noun phrase such as 'The little, red, spiky seahorse' in our writing.

In our Maths lessons this week, we have started a new unit of work called 'Position and Direction'. In this unit, we have been looking at the language we use to describe how and where things move. So this week we have been learning about – left and right, forwards and backwards, clockwise and anticlockwise. We have also begun to talk about moving a quarter turn, half turn or full turn and we practised giving each other directions using some of this new vocabulary.

In our Topic lessons, we have been finding out about weather patterns and the climate in different parts of the world and we have begun to learn about food chains in our Science this week too.



The children really enjoyed wearing red, white and blue on Friday and taking part in lots of activities to celebrate the coronation of King Charles III this coming Saturday.

News from Peacock Class (Year 3)

What a wonderful ostentation of peacocks we are. Somehow, we have managed to fit a whole week of work into our shortened week and enjoyed coronation activities!



In English, we worked in our 'Man in the Forest groups 'to write our final drafts of the story and make a group book. Each group wrote about a fox, deer, snake and hedgehog in the style of J Barrett, the stories' author. We spent some time discussing the moral of the story; man needs to live with the forest and take only what he needs rather than everything he wants, in that way man, the forest and all her creatures can live in balance with each other.

Next week we will begin work on the Tudors, eventually writing a diary entry after our visit to the Tudor doctor!

In Maths, we have started to look at money, so far we have worked out the total of coins given and converted this between

pounds and pence. Along with adding amounts. If you get a chance over the weekend, please have a go at a money scavenger hunt. Send the children off around the house to look in drawers, pots, the side of the sofa, etc. to see how much change they can find. Add this up convert it to pounds, then ask what other coins could be used to make the same amount.

In other news, we have continued our work on the science of plants by looking at what plants need to grow well, setting up fair tests to prove that plants need, light, water and nutrients. We have also set up an investigation to see what soil type peas prefer. Plant science will continue again next week.

In PSHE we continued to look at our own Networks of Support and how we can ask them for

help. We then looked at other sources of support for emergency situations and what we can do if we are lost. We also recalled the feelings that make part of our EWS (Early Warning Signs).



In music we listened to Jazz and discovered how some of the music from the 1920s and 30s still influences our music today.





On Friday, we finished our week with coronation capers, in class we solved the mystery of the missing crown, resolved riddles to complete a scavenger hunt and completed our classes' tiles that will form part of a whole school coronation themed display.

Please remember our visit to Burghley House is on 10th May (next Wednesday) children are invited to dress in Tudor costume for the day, and will need a packed lunch, including snacks and drinks.





News from Swift Class (Year 4)


Swift Class have enjoyed our shorter than normal week but have still managed to pack in a fair amount of learning.

In our maths lessons, we have been focusing on identifying different types of angles: acute, obtuse, reflex and right angles. Through various activities and exercises, children have become more confident in identifying and classifying these angles.

In PE, Swift Class has been practising bowling skills for cricket - working on technique, remembering to keep their bowling arm straight for increased accuracy and control. It's been wonderful to see the children make great progress in this element of the game.

In English, we have been learning about how to structure paragraphs effectively. Focusing on the topic of climate change, we have been exploring different ways to organise elements such as statements, examples and explanations in a clear and logical manner within a paragraph.

With a nod to the King's upcoming Coronation, our art lessons featured a great deal of red, white and blue. We investigated more bespoke and stylised weaving patterns in the colours of the Union Jack flag. The children learnt about the history of coronations and were encouraged to be creative and experimental in their weaving designs. The children's individual styles can be seen in the finished woven pieces.



Finally, we want to wish all the class and their families a very happy Coronation weekend. If you choose to, we hope you have a wonderful time celebrating this special occasion, and we look forward to seeing you all again next week.

News from Heron Class (Year 5)

This week in Maths, we have learnt how to multiply fractions. We have multiplied unit and non-unit fractions by integers and then multiplied mixed numbers by integers. This will lead into our block of work on decimals and percentages later this half term.

In spelling this week, we have continued to focus on converting nouns and adjectives into verbs using the suffix –ise. This has taken place alongside our continuing work on recounts.

This week in Science, we have developed our work on reversible and irreversible change. We considered changes and tried to classify them as either reversible (physical) changes or irreversible (chemical) changes. These included cooking an egg, melting butter, mixing sand, salt, paper clips and water together and preparing filler that we might find at home and use for DIY projects.

Our Kwik cricket skills are developing well and we enjoyed some competitive matches in our PE lesson this week - now that we all know the rules we are looking forward to more mini matches next week!

Our Geography work this week focussed on the continent of North America. We learnt that it contains 23 countries which we were able to see on a political map. We contrasted this with a map showing the physical features of North America. We watched a film clip to highlight the diversity of the continent – focusing on key physical features, eg, Niagara Falls, the Grand Canyon, Death Valley and human features, eg, The Golden Gate Bridge in San Francisco, The Hoover Dam, The Panama Canal etc

On Friday, we spent time in school preparing for the Coronation. We contributed our pieces to the whole school collage of King Charles and enjoyed

solving some royal puzzles by cracking the clues.

In R.E., we thought about the Hindu idea of Moksha and thought about the many ways that it is possible to achieve a goal. We considered whether any particular way is always the best way to solve a problem and whether this is true in every situation for every person. We used the Hindu


proverb shown here to help us decide what Hindus think about this.


