Notice Board

Head lice

Please note that staff have identified a number of cases of head lice around the school. Please could we ask you to check and treat your child/children as required.

The NHS advice is as follows:

Wet combing

Lice and nits can be removed by wet combing. You should try this method first. You can buy a special fine-toothed comb (detection comb) online or from pharmacies to remove head lice and nits. (The Nitty Gritty comb gets particularly good reviews)

There may be instructions on the pack, but usually you:

- wash hair with ordinary shampoo
- apply lots of conditioner (any conditioner will do)
- comb the whole head of hair, from the roots to the ends
 It usually takes about 10 minutes to comb short hair, and 20 to 30 minutes for long, frizzy or curly hair.

Do wet combing on days 1, 5, 9 and 13 to catch any newly hatched head lice. Check again that everyone's hair is free of lice on day 17.

Tummy upsets

There seem to be a few tummy bugs working their way around school at the moment,.

Please remember that there is a 48-hour period after any episode of sickness or diarrhoea which children must be kept off school. News from Starling Class (Reception)

The children have had a jam packed half term settling back into school after their Christmas and New Year break. They have been using and applying their knowledge of numbers to 10 and started learning about measuring in Maths. We have come to the end of our Phase 3 learning in Phonics and for the next two half terms we will be revisiting and consolidating our knowledge in our sessions and in small group work.



Earlier this week we sent home your child's most recent Phonics results relating to grapheme/phoneme correspondence (saying the sound the letter/s make), knowledge of Harder To Read and Spell words and their ability to decode simple words and pseudo words

using the sounds they have been taught. The highlights show you the areas which require further practice at home and these will be the main focus of group work next half term. Thank you as always for your continued support with homework.



We have sent PE bags back for the half termly wash. We would encourage you to use the half term holiday to check your child's PE kit, trainers and school shoes as we are half way through the year, and children's feet and legs are notorious for growing half way through the year!

Next half term the children will be turning their attention to what

our bodies can do and how to look after them in PSHE; think about why Christians celebrate Easter in RE; look closely at Science, Maths and Technology; the season of spring and the

celebration of Mother's Day in addition to our agricultural adventure to the farm.

Queen Mother's Handwriting Award






News from Robin Class (Year 1)

We have had a bit of a 'round up' week in many respects this week. We have had a follow-up focus on the essentials when writing sentences; always using a capital letter to start each sentence – and reminding everyone that means after every full stop as well as when we start writing; remembering to leave a space between each word; remembering that proper nouns need capital letters and that every sentence needs a full stop. These seem obvious to most of us, but do point out this in reading books when reading to children over

the Half Term break!

However, we have also begun thinking about imperative verbs! Your child should remember that they are 'bossy verbs' but I have introduced the 'proper' word as well, because children just love using all that super language. They 'bossed' me when I was making a toy and then spent their English lesson making their own creation and trying to use and write down all the imperative



verbs they were using. We ended up with over 20 words they were able to identify!

I have taken in reading books for half term. Please continue to record in the Reading Record Book the books your child enjoys from home or the library over half term. Your child should have come home with the graphemes we have learned this week – please do



continue to use these to make real and alien words, and do let your child enjoy sharing books with you over the holiday. They may be reading them, they may be listening to you and watching the words as you read to them. They may do both and start to think about where that full stop came in the middle of a paragraph! All of this is good experience and wonderful for their developing brains.





News from Owl Class (Year 2)

This week we celebrated Children's Mental Health week. The children engaged in activities around the theme 'Let's Connect', thinking about what makes us special and what links us to each other; how do we connect and why? The children enjoyed taking part in activities which focussed on the different ways in which we can connect with our classmates. They

also talked about how important it is to celebrate our differences and similarities and to reflect on how, despite our differences, we are all connected. They then went on to use a template to record their likes and interests and we have made this into a 'Let's Connect' display.



In our English work this week the children have planned and written their own imaginative

stories entitled 'The King's Hat'. Their stories were inspired by the Steve Antony book 'The Queen's Hat', where the queen's hat travels all around London, landing on lots of London landmarks on its way. In our stories, King Charles is visiting Steeple Morden School, to mark the year of his coronation. During his visit, his top hat finds itself being swept up by gusts of wind over the roof and onto the playstructure before gliding to Mrs How's office, floating to Owl class, to the hall and back again! The children have enjoyed writing imaginatively this week, sharing their ideas and creating their own stories.

In our Maths work this week, we have completed our block of learning on Multiplication and Division. The children have enjoyed dividing through sharing and through grouping and they can now show division of 2, 5 and 10 on number lines, as number sentences or through pictorial representations.



In our topic work this week the children have completed their trio of London landmarks created using different media; charcoal, pastel and pencil. The artwork will be coming home this week to be shared with you and the children will be keen to tell you all about their London landmark and the interesting facts they have learnt.

In music this week the children have completed the unit 'I wanna play in a band' and performed the song with both instrumental and voice together in small groups to the rest of the class. The children really enjoyed this lesson and should be proud of what they achieved.

Assemblies, Collective Worship and Reflection

Our assembly theme this week was Resilience with the Bible reading coming from the book of Joshua. We thought about how the Israelites had to be resilient (showing bravery and being able to overcome difficulties) and how their faith in God led to the fall of the walls of Jericho.

Resilience also ties in with our focus on Mental Health and how important it is to not give up, especially when we feel as if no one is listening.

Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go. (Joshua 1 v9)



News from Peacock Class (Year 3)

Maths, The BIG measure.

This week we have started our unit of maths work on length and perimeter. On Tuesday, if we could see it, we measured it, using different measuring equipment; rulers, tape measures, metre sticks and trundle wheels. We measured everything from pens, glue, scissors, the play structure, fence posts, each other... We even considered how we could measure the width of a piece of a paper. After some



thought we came up with the cunning plan of creating a pile of paper from a known number of sheets, measuring it and then dividing the measurement by the number of sheets. Once we had gained an understanding of how to measure, we set about drawing lines of a given length, and solving a few simple measuring problems. This focus for maths will continue after half term.

In English work, we completed our final draft of the letters for Howard Carter; these are now in our topic books ready for you to see the next time you come in for coffee.

We then started our work on instructions. So far, we have identified the key features and completed some work on imperative verbs and adverbs, key elements in instructional writing. Work on this will continue after half term as we work towards writing our instructions to mummify a pharaoh.

Our Canopic jars are now complete, ready for their part in the mummification process. With our peers we evaluated our product by looking back at the given brief and our plans. We then awarded 2 Stars and a wish against the criteria.

The science investigation into preserving body parts *still* continues. This week we have carried out more careful observations and recorded the changes we could see in the shape, colour, size or texture of the grapes. We decided that vinegar made the best preserving liquid, as despite the grape changing colour, this was the only change that had occurred. However, we are in no rush to eat the grape. The control grapes had all changed colour, shape and texture and two showed




signs of moulding. By comparing the control grapes to those in the liquids, we could see what effect the liquids had compared to doing nothing with the grapes.



In PSHE we discussed the different cultures ,traditions and beliefs within our community and the UK. We identified what we have in common with people and some differences between us. We also looked at the different aspects that make up our identity

After half term, we will be looking at the Ancient Egyptian Gods, and linking this with our art work about sculpture. If you happen to see any sculptures while you are out and about during half term please point them out to the children.



Please, please, over half term <u>read</u> and note this in the children's reading diaries. Less than 1/5 of the class are regularly reading at home. A few minutes four times a week makes such a difference to their progress and understanding of reading. Reading underpins independence in learning.

If you are planning days out over half term may I suggest the British Museum in London, https://www.britishmuseum.org/collection/egypt or the Fitzwilliam Museum in Cambridge https://www.fitzmuseum.cam.ac.uk/about-us/collections/egypt. These museums both have Egyptian sections, all the children have been really taken with this topic, so visits to see 'real' Egyptian things could be rather exciting. Swaffham is where Howard Carter would visit when he was young and suffering from ill health, the museum in the town has a Howard Carter room; I have not yet been so I cannot advise, but I plan to visit during half term. https://www.swaffhammuseum.co.uk/

News from Swift Class (Year 4)

In Science children have been collating their knowledge about electrical circuits to create their own wire buzzer game. The aim is to skilfully guide the loop around the course without making contact with the wire. We have also been doing some work as part of the 'cut your carbon' campaign to reduce energy use by not leaving devices on unnecessarily.



Children enjoyed wearing some different clothes on Friday as part of 'dress to express' day to end children's mental health week. We have been discussing the importance of feelings and developing a 'sense of self'. We also thought about hobbies that help us to connect with others, making a paper chain to represent this.



News from Heron Class (Year 5)

Many thanks for all of the optional homework projects that have been filtering into school this week. It is clear that children (and parents) have spent many hours working on (and supporting) these. The class are really enjoying presenting them to the class. We are aware that some children have chosen space as their theme so would like to go to the observatory in March before completing their projects. Some children are also doing things over half term which they would like to add. Please either send in your project this week, if it is completed, but equally at the start of next half term will be fine for those children who haven't quite finished.

Our Maths unit on Fractions is almost at an end and we have been impressed with how much progress the children have made from their starting points. This week the focus has been on different ways of adding and subtracting fractions – both when two fractions have the same denominator and also when we need to convert fractions to the same denominator by finding multiples. Our progress with tackling tables has also given us more understanding of the relationship between different fraction families and enabled us to calculate equivalent fractions at speed.

In English this week, we have continued with our intensive look back over all of the grammar that the children are expected to be familiar with by Year 5. We have so far covered nouns (common, proper, concrete, abstract and collective), pronouns, adjectives, verbs and tense, adverbs, prepositions, types of sentence (statements, questions, commands and exclamational sentences) and conjunctions! We are looking forward to seeing these being used in the children's independent writing and we will continue to reinforce these over the course of the year.

Our History work this week involved completing our Roman coin designs by painting them carefully and then looking in detail at some of the armour and weaponry used by Roman soldiers. We designed our own shields and will look forward to making these in Design Technology after half term.

Thank you to those parents who were able to join us for the Grafham meeting, either in person or remotely. Please look out for the information packs in your child's bag if you were unable to come into school. We would be grateful if you could return all of the relevant completed paperwork as soon as possible.

We hope you all have a relaxing half term break and the children return to school on Monday 20th February fully recharged for lots more Year 5 learning!

News from Puffin Class (Year 6)

In English we have finished writing our non-chronological reports based on the Titanic. We have edited them, which included checking for punctuation, spelling, grammar, and vocabulary and sentence structure, to see if we could improve the overall piece of writing. Year 6 have worked very hard on this and have really enjoyed researching and writing about the Titanic. Well done to all.

This week, in Maths, we have started to study our next topic: algebra and linear number sequences. We have also finished our work on ratio and proportion. Ask your child to remember that ratio compares part to part and proportion compares part to the whole.

We have also finished our latest round of SATs papers this week, with the children completing papers on spellings, SPAG and reading. Again, a great effort all round as they gear up for their actual SATs exams in the middle of May.

Thank you to all parents that came to the meeting on Tuesday 7th February about the residential trip to the Peak District in Derbyshire. I hope that you found it informative. The kit list was given out at the meeting, please contact the school office if you need (another) one.

Homework will be set again this Friday and should be completed by Thursday 23rd February.


