



Message from Mrs How:

Christmas has been slowly creeping up on us over the last few weeks as children rehearse songs and spoken words for our Christmas celebrations. Now that we have reached December, the decorated tree in the main reception area and other Christmas displays and decorations add to the festive feeling.

We have a difficult task in schools during this time of year. Most children are looking forward to Christmas and are quite rightly excited about all the treats and events ahead... but we still have a curriculum to cover and lots of learning to fit in. We also try hard to support those children who we know may have a more difficult Christmas – those where households have financial difficulties, those where families are in crisis and those children who prefer the routine and security of school. As you can imagine there are lots of different expectations and emotions for us to try to balance at the moment.



News from Starling Class (Reception)

Hello from Starling Class!

This week the children have been focusing on becoming performance ready. They have been learning what it means to be a part of a cast, identifying their cues, getting into character, dancing in time to music, singing in time (and tune) with others and learning what it means to be an audience member. The children have worked hard this week on their listening and attention skills alongside practising patience! We are very much looking forward to seeing you all at the Nativity performances next week and can't wait to share your child's hard work with you all.



In Phonics this week, the children have learnt four new graphemes ai, ee, igh and oa. They have been working hard to use their knowledge to recognise these graphemes within words and sentences, use these graphemes in their writing alongside practising their previously learnt graphemes and Harder To Read and Spell words too. In Maths this week, we have been thinking about spatial awareness and using positional language to describe where items are located e.g. the bear is in the bedroom on the bed. It has been lovely to hear the children practicing using their mathematical language during COOL Time this week instead of saying "it's over there", there has been more of "it's on the shelf next to the pens."

Next week's Show and Tell will be the turn of the Blueberries, please invite your child to bring in an item relating to Christmas, winter or an item of interest to share with the class on Friday.



Prepare yourselves for very tired children next week, for many of the Starlings this will be their first foray into the world of performing and so the adrenaline and anxiety will take their toll. We will be having a slower week to account for heightened emotions, illness and tiredness which usually accumulates around Nativity performance week. Next week we will be reviewing our Phonics progress so far, checking our Maths knowledge and begin looking at the Italian artist Giuseppe Arcimboldo.

Please remember to check your child's blue reading record booklet for any messages we may have written in each day, and do let us know how your child is getting on with their homework.



In Maths, we have been continuing to look at 2d shapes and sort them in different ways. such as colour or number of sides.




In our Design and Technology lesson this week, the children created springy paper creatures to inhabit their island.





News from Owl Class (Year 2)

We've all had a very busy week this week practising for our 'Wriggly Nativity' performance with all three classes in the hall. The children are all really excited to share this with you next week. Thank you for your help with providing costumes and learning lines at home too. Some early nights might be helpful early next week, in readiness for their performances to the rest of the school on Monday afternoon, and to parents on Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons.

In our English work this week we have continued to read and talk about Traditional Tales and this week we focussed on the story of 'The Elves and the Shoemaker'. The children have looked at recurring themes in traditional tales and they've collected adjectives to describe characters such as the elves in this story.



In our Maths work this week, we've continued to focus on the properties of 2D shapes. We have been learning vocabulary such as 'sides' and 'vertices' as well as sorting shapes into groups according to their properties. We also folded a range of 2D shapes to find their lines of symmetry.

News from Peacock Class (Year 3)

In English, we have finished our descriptive work based on Charlie and the Chocolate Factory. We all feel very proud of what we have managed to write as, when we started, we did not believe it possible to write a descriptive passage using prepositions, adjectives, adverbs and similes, but we have all managed it with great success. We are going to try to transfer our skills in descriptive writing to produce a synopsis for a box of chocolate flavoured fudge.



In Maths, we have embarked on our unit about multiplication and division. So far, we have recognised multiplication as the total from equal groups, and that multiplication is the same as repeated addition. We had lots of fun creating multiplication sentences using this picture. How many multiplication calculations can you make using it?

Wednesday was an exciting day, some children enjoyed a morning at Wimpole on a cross-country run and everyone that took part really did do their best and should feel rightly proud. Those that stayed in school created a range of decorations for the school hall during the festive season.

In topic work this week we have started our DT by looking at and evaluating packaging, so far we have considered why we have packaging, what jobs does it do? What packaging can look like? Does it look different for different uses? What does chocolate packaging look like, how does it differ for different products? What does it need to look like and why is this important?

Ultimately, we will be designing and making our own mini chocolate box.

Practising for the church service continues, the children are remembering what to do and when very well. Unless you have been asked

otherwise, the children need to wear a t-shirt under a Christmas jumper. The t-shirt is needed as some children change into an outfit provided by us. Trousers, skirts or leggings as appropriate for bottom half.



We are lucky enough to have a connection with a French speaking school in Geneva (we know this is part of Switzerland). This week in French we had our first go at writing in the language; we have made a Christmas card to send over to Geneva. We have our fingers crossed that we will be able to link with them via Zoom. In anticipation of this we have been learning Silent Night in French.

Additional homework task suggestions for Year 3

We have all been exciting and enthusiastic about our 'Dahlicious' topic. The children have so far enjoyed looking at the features of biographies, information text on foxes, and descriptive language. They have also looked at the works of Quentin Blake, and collage techniques. Urban and rural features have been discussed, and in science what makes a healthy diet, bones and muscles and the science behind light.

- To compliment this work, you might like to do something at home that broadly related to our topic, this could be about foxes, maybe a fund raising pack explaining the need for monies to be raised along with poster, ideas, games etc. that could be used to raise the funds.
- They may like to research and produce a fact file about a different species of foxes.
- They could think about their favourite Roald Dahl book, and create a board game set around the book's events. Alternatively think about the central character and write a new adventure for them. Create a puppet theatre to retell the story.
- Create and cook a meal themed on a character along with a recipe card and instructions so that it could be recreated.
- Plan a birthday party themed around the events and characters in a book. This could include a homemade outfit, and list of suggested party games.
- Write a script for a favourite scene along with stage directions and suggested props.

These are only suggestions, please feel free to come up with your own ideas, anything goes as long as it is somehow related to our topic 'Dahlicious'.

We will share any creations in the last week of term.

News from Swift Class (Year 4)

This week we have been furthering our knowledge of three states of matter – solids, liquids and gasses. Learning how the internal structure affects how the matter behaves helps us with categorisation. Last year a child, after visiting the free observatory talks mentioned in the homework grid, proclaimed there is a fourth fundamental state of matter



that we don't talk about much... house point to anyone who knows what that is!

Well done to everyone who took part in the Wimpole cross country event with other schools earlier this week. The children enjoyed practising this event and being part of a competition that involved a range of other schools from the area. We are proud that they tried their best and paced themselves well.

In our PSHE lessons we have been discussing emotions and how we guess what others may be feeling. As we get older we are more precise about describing how we are feeling and why we may be feeling that way.

Throughout the autumn term, we have been revising the [year 3 and 4 statutory spelling list](#) The spellings on spelling frame for the rest of the term will cover this from f to h so we should be fairly competent with the first third of the list by January.

Last week Mrs Seward mentioned about song words for the Christmas Service so if you can keep revisiting these would be helpful. If your child has more than a few lines to learn, I will send these home next week.

News from Heron Class (Year 5)

This week in English, we have continued our work on instruction texts and have been researching the best way to make a Victoria sponge (for our guests at a certain Year 5 upcoming Christmas celebration in school!) This cake is believed to have been a favourite afternoon tea treat for Queen Victoria and so fits in nicely with our work on Victorians too. The children have also come back once again to learning/improving their understanding of main and subordinate clauses, an idea that a few of us still find quite tricky and we will continue to revisit throughout Year 5.



In Maths we have been working on our problem solving skills and putting into practice some of our work on multiples, factors, prime numbers, square and cube numbers. We talked about what we mean by the following 3 key terms in our teaching of Maths:-

Fluency - use number sense, be flexible, choose an appropriate, efficient and accurate method

Problem Solving - solve daily life problems using mathematical knowledge and skill

Reasoning - the bridge between fluency and problem solving (applying logical thinking to help to find a solution to a problem)

We also developed our understanding of how to multiply numbers by 10, 100 and 1,000. We thought back to our work on place value and how we would move our numbers to the left on the place value chart and the role of zero as a place holder.

In Science, we have carried out another experiment to investigate the properties of materials. This week, we have been learning about thermal conductivity and have tested various materials to see which one allowed the heat to travel through it most quickly.

You will have received a Parentmail this week about an optional homework before the end of term. We looked at a whole range of inventors and innovations in our History lesson on Wednesday so the children should have some good ideas for this!

We visited the Church at the start of the week to have a think about our forthcoming Church Service. All of the children will be involved in either an acting, singing or speaking role.

We have also spent some time this week considering the RE question 'What kind of King is Jesus?'

We discussed whether we believe that Jesus came to Earth to show people how to get into Heaven or if He came to Earth to make Earth more like Heaven. Once again, we are pleased to say that the children had interesting ideas to share and listened to one another's points of view.

News from Puffin Class (Year 6)

In Maths lessons, we have continued to work on fractions. We have looked at equivalent fractions and how to write these, draw these and look at these visually too. Next, we simplified and ordered fractions, and looked at the common multiples to help us with this. Ask your child what this means: whatever you do to the top you do to the bottom.

In English, we have continued to study the Shakespeare



play, 'A Midsummer Night's Dream'. We have focussed on a character from the play and worked on improving a descriptive paragraph with adjectives, adjectival phrases and punctuation. The class also performed short pieces of drama about the play after we divided it into segments. See the attached pictures showing our freeze frames of the play.

We have to work through another batch of practice SATs papers in Reading, Maths and SPAG. We will continue this into next week.



Thank you to all those that competed in the cross-country race at Wimpole Hall on Wednesday. It was a tough course but a beautiful autumnal day, and all seemed to enjoy the competitive and personal aspects of the event.



Homework should be completed by Thursday 8th December – thank you. Keep on reading and learning those times tables please – these are crucial to their mathematical development.


