\* For sickness and/or diarrhea it is essential to keep your child away from school **until 48 hours after the last episode of diarrhoea/vomiting**. Please remember if your child is unwell they will be much more comfortable at home with a parent or carer who can look after them much more closely than we can in school.

# News from Robin Class (Year 1)

This week, your children have worked incredibly hard, thinking about all the facts they have found out, learned and are able to talk about with regard to caterpillars changing into butterflies (or moths!) and tadpoles changing into frogs. We have discussed this over the last week of so, researching different pieces of information they thought they knew and answering questions about what they wanted to know. On Wednesday, they wrote their own information page! These included photos of their chosen animal, headings for different parts of the information, captions and labels for diagrams. We were blown away with their enthusiasm and commitment for writing.

In Maths, we have been using language related to the passing of time – yesterday, tomorrow, before, after, next, first, finally, etc. We have ordered days of the week and months of the year, solving problems and working out what tomorrow would be if today was Tuesday, or what 4 months time would be or 2 months ago. We had lots of fun together and have tried to write months of the year. We have also assessed where children are with learning to spell the days of



the week. Do keep up the practise – we've noticed that although a few have really done well, many have forgotten what they knew in May!

Our class potatoes are nearly ready to harvest and we will be trying these next week, hopefully! All the ladybirds have now been released to munch aphids in the garden and school hedges, but we are now a lot more aware of what to look for in terms of larvae and not being worried by different species of ladybird.

Children in Rosen and Rashford houses have come home with their PE kits today, ready to be worn in to school on Tuesday next week for their Sports Day. After this, we will have one more PE lesson on Friday next week (so please send them back in) and they will come home again after that for the Summer! We will NOT have a PE lesson in the final 3 days.

We have collected in Reading books today to give staff a chance to sort, order and prepare them for next year. Feel free to read as much as possible at home this week – it is lovely to hear about 'home stories' from your children.

Do continue to send in sun hats as well as a lightweight coat in case of showers. Also, we had a mishap this week, where a water bottle



contained orange squash. Please ensure there is only water in bottles. It is healthier, saves our carpet and won't encourage ants into the classroom! Thank you!



Next week, we will send home P.E kits on Monday. They will then be ready for children from Red and White Teams to wear for their Sports Day on Tuesday morning.



## News from Peacock Class (Year 3)

News from Peacock Class (Year 3)

This week's highlight was the walk to Ashwell. In preparation for the walk and visit, we spent some time reminding ourselves about the facts we have gathered so far along our pathways

through the past.



There is evidence of a settlement in Ashwell from as far back as the Iron Age. We know this as archaeologists have found evidence and artefacts in the form of postholes, pottery remains, metalwork, and evidence of fires from domestic and early manufacturing. We were able to talk knowledgeably about these and how they would have been used by the Celts and the impact they had on the development of farming and daily life.

Jumping to the Tudors, we were able to talk about how and why houses were built and what they looked like. We could remember what show offs the Tudors were, given the chance, about how wealthy they were. We also discussed how superstition about spirits influenced their beliefs and lives. We listed what evidence we expected to find in Ashwell about its Tudor past.

Another leap through time found us in the 1940s. We expected evidence of Ashwell life in this time to be more plentiful; there may even be people to talk to that were actually there! We wrote a considerable list of what could be stored in the museum about this period.

Following all of these discussions we came up with a list of questions to find out why people live in Ashwell today, what does it have to offer, why do people choose to settle there and why do people





The walk itself went very well, the weather was kind and we had lots of fun, although we were sure the school had been moved further away while we were in Ashwell, as the walk back

seemed very long and much brisker than the walk there!



While in Ashwell, we had a snack and play in the park, visited the museum, went in the church, had a walking tour of Ashwell, interviewed 'Ashlothians', had a picnic, and had a very enthusiastic paddle in the Springs, all before heading back to school for the end of the day.

I cannot imagine why anyone wouldn't have slept well on Tuesday night!

Back in the classroom, we have started work on creating a leaflet about Ashwell today; we are doing this in small groups so that we can share out all the work. This will form the basis of our work until the end of the year (I can hardly believe I have just written that last sentence, I do not know how we have reached this point of the year so very soon, time flying and fun!!)

# News from Swift Class (Year 4)

In art lessons, the children have continued to work on their textile projects, drawing inspiration from artist Hannah Rae. The children's sea and landscapes are embellished using different stitching techniques to draw out different features such as grasses, furrows and wave crests.

Our written work has been focusing on revisiting punctuation of written dialogue. Dialogue is one of the ways we can move a narrative on but we also interweave our dialogue with actions and descriptions so our text avoids sounding like a radio transcript.

In our maths lessons, we have been focusing on comparing amounts of money, building upon the decimal work we recently covered. The children have been



developing their understanding of currency and comparing and ordering different amounts of money. Some have been especially motivated by this and if your child is



eager to put their newfound mathematical knowledge to the test in the real world, our school fete will be taking place tomorrow, and it will be the perfect occasion for them to practice their skills!

# News from Heron Class (Year 5)

We have had an extremely busy and enjoyable week in Year 5 combining Bikeability with all our usual learning.



Bikeability Cycle Training is a scheme funded by Cambridge County Council. The aim of the training is to give pupils the confidence to use their cycles on residential roads. The instructors spent their time with us working on Bikeability levels 1 and 2. This involved developing everyone's cycling skills, creating positive attitudes towards road users and increasing knowledge and understanding of the rules of the road. The children spent time in small groups, initially on the playground and then on local roads, identifying and responding to hazards, maintaining suitable riding positions, negotiating

junctions, complying with signals, signs and road markings and communicating with other road users. Well done to everyone who took part.

In Maths, we continued our work on shape, concentrating on calculating angles around a point and on a straight line. We also learnt how to calculate lengths and angles in shapes and identify regular and irregular polygons.

In English this week, we have concentrated on prefixes. These are groups of letters that can be added to the beginning of a root word that change the meaning of the root word. We have focused on the prefixes 're-', 'de-' and 'over-'. We have also practised our comprehension and debating skills, linked to our work on healthy lifestyles in PSHE.

Finally, a quick reminder that next week on Thursday 13th July there is an opportunity for

you to join us in school from 9.30-10.30am to have a look at the work that your children have produced during their time in Year 5. We will also be sharing with you the photos that we took whilst at Grafham. You should have received an invitation today from

your child to this event and

we thought we would push the boat out a little and write it in both Italian and



English! Why not challenge your child and see how much of the invitation they can read aloud to you in Italian?


Homework will continue to be linked to the production.

# **School Uniform Guide**

#### **Clothing**

- Trousers, shorts, skirt or pinafore (navy or grey)
- Blouse, shirt or polo shirt (white or royal blue)
- School sweatshirt or cardigan (royal blue)
- Blue and white check dress during the summer months
- It is a Year 6 privilege to wear black uniform (polo tops, jumpers and trousers/skirts/shorts)

#### **PE Kit** (to be kept in a bag, which is hung in the cloakroom):

- T-shirt (colour of assigned House) separate to that worn during the day
- Shorts (blue or black)

#### In addition (from Year 1 onwards):

- Tracksuit or jogging bottoms and sweatshirt without hood for the winter months
- Trainers for outdoors

#### Year 4 pupils will need:

- swim wear (swimming costumes should be one piece and swimming trunks should be above knee length)
- a towel
- swimming hat all children (available for purchase from the pool)

#### Shoes

- Children will travel to and from school in black school shoes
- The majority of children will remain in these shoes all day
- Children who wish to change into an older pair of trainers at playtime (much better for kicking a ball on a muddy field) can do so if they wish
- Children will need a change of footwear for PE lessons

#### Please ensure your child can fasten, without assistance, the shoes they wear for school.

**Coat:** It is very important that your child comes to school with a coat appropriate for the season. All children go outside to play at break time and lunch time and, as you know, the British weather can change during the school day! Reception Class also have an outside learning area.

**Book Bag:** Each child should have a book bag to keep reading books clean and safe on the journey to and from school.

- Children are responsible for the safety of their own jewellery and watches.
