## Message from Mrs How:

It's hard to believe that we are now half way through the school year - it doesn't seem that long ago since we welcomed the children into their new classes in September. Now that we are almost at the end of February we can look back and reflect on all the learning that has taken place and see the progress that the children have made. Teachers are looking forward to sharing this with you at our next Parents Evenings on 7th and 9th March, Parentmail bookings will open at 10am tomorrow (Saturday).

Next week we will be marking World Book Day. Although this actually takes place on Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> March, we will be engaging in all things book related on Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> as this fits better with our timetabling and other activities. We work hard to help children develop their reading skills, from those first phonic sounds in Reception to developing a deeper understanding of the text through inference, deduction and engagement in Year 6. Reading really is at the heart of learning and we hope that all children leaving Steeple will find enjoyment in reading and are able to find books and reading materials which appeal to their interests.

We spend a lot of time in school teaching reading, but there is often limited time to help the children practise. This is where we rely on families at home to support the children. If you are able to spend just 10 minutes a day reading to your child, listening to your child read or talking about the books they are reading this will make a huge difference to their progress. Please ask your child's teacher at parents evening if there is anything more you could do to help your child develop this key learning skill.

## **Notice Board**

## Head lice

Please note that staff have identified a number of cases of head lice around the school. Please could we ask you to check and treat your child/children as required.

The NHS advice is as follows:

#### Wet combing

Lice and nits can be removed by wet combing. You should try this method first. You can buy a special fine-toothed comb (detection comb) online or from pharmacies to remove head lice and nits. (The Nitty Gritty comb gets particularly good reviews)

There may be instructions on the pack, but usually you:

- wash hair with ordinary shampoo
- apply lots of conditioner (any conditioner will do)
- comb the whole head of hair, from the roots to the ends
   It usually takes about 10 minutes to comb short hair, and 20 to 30 minutes for long, frizzy or curly hair.

Do wet combing on days 1, 5, 9 and 13 to catch any newly hatched head lice. Check again that everyone's hair is free of lice on day 17.

Welcome back from Starling Class!

The children have had a wonderful week learning about weight using balance scales in Maths, played doctors and nurses in the role play area, and have been learning about our bodies. We have been reviewing our Phase 3 Phonics learning and applying our knowledge to reading and writing too!

This week the children were overheard using their new vocabulary during the school day "I have got SUCH a big

**appetite**" and "I am **extract**ing this blood from my patient", who knew we had such wordsmiths in our midst! We thought it would be a good idea to share with you our weekly interesting words and their definitions each week, so please find this weeks below.

Appetite	A desire for food or drink
Extract	To remove or take something out
Abundance	When there is more than enough of something
Domestic	Belonging or relating to the home, house or family
Inconspicuous	Not seen or attracting attention

This half term the children will be participating in balance bike activities every Tuesday afternoon. If your child has their own helmet, then please do send them (named) into school, just let us know if they need to be returned each week or if they can stay at school for this half term. We do

have a few helmets at school if your child does not have one, but please can we ask that long hair is tied low enough that a helmet will fit securely on their head without requiring adjustments. Next week, Show and Tell will recommence with the Yellow Bananas. We're learning about 'growing' so any items relating to this would be particularly appreciated.



As a school, this year we will be looking at a poetry collection from renowned performance poet Benjamin Zephaniah, celebrating the diversity of British society. A unique portrait of British children, Benjamin has written 12 poems, each one about a child in his or her home environment. The children are from a range of backgrounds and cultures and the book challenges traditional perceptions of the way children live. It shows that despite their differences, children have many similar preoccupations whatever their cultural background. We Are Britain springs from the rich interaction between many peoples which characterises modern Britain.

## News from Robin Class (Year 1)

It has been lovely to see all your children back this week after the break. On Monday we heard about some of the things they were able to do during the week; what a range of bike rides, family walks, holidays away, day trips, meeting friends at the park and film nights at home we heard about. We hope you enjoyed the week as much as they seem to have!



The children have continued thinking about imperative verbs and instructions this week as they all made their animal marionettes. We will be writing our own instructions to say how to make these, hopefully next week, and will be making another class book with the children's writing and photos.

On Thursday, we invited other classes from across the school into Robin Classroom to visit our class Toy Museum. The children were very proud of the toys they were able to exhibit and all the teachers who came around were impressed with the knowledge, labels and range of toys that have been loaned to us. Thank you again for your part in this activity. We will begin to send toys home next week, but if you still have one to show, don't be shy about sending it in!





Phonics this week has seen us learning the last new graphemes we will learn for a few weeks. The grapheme cards are in the children's Reading Record Book and are shown in the table below. Next week will be an assessment week and then they will be bringing home books which will reinforce or practise the sounds they are not yet confident with.

igh/ie	light/pie	i-e	kite

In Maths, the children have been very enthusiastic learning about the 'greater than' (>) and 'less than (<) symbols. We have been making sure we have read the 'number sentence' from left to right and included the correct phrases before placing the symbol.

Then we said, "15 is less than 19, 19 is greater than 14"

Then we filled in the gaps: 15 < 19 > 14

We have intentionally NOT mentioned 'the crocodile wants to eat the bigger number' because this does NOT promote understanding of what each symbol actually represents! If your child is not yet confident with using the symbols, please do not worry. **We** are confident that most children can use the 'greater than' and 'less than' language. The symbols are re-visited later in Year 1 and again throughout the school.



## News from Owl Class (Year 2)

The children have returned from half term well rested and eager to get back into their routines and expectations. We have a had a fun busy week fitting in lots of learning, a visit to Year 1's toy museum and a number of investigations for Maths.

In our Maths work this week, we have looked at measuring and comparing lengths and heights using both centimetres and metres. The children enjoyed investigating various lengths of objects from around the classroom and putting them in the correct order from shortest to longest or tallest. Trying to line up in height order also revealed some competitive spirits!



In our English work this week, we have been finding out about the author Julia Donaldson and her story 'Stick Man.' We have sequenced the order of events in the story and then we went on to write sentences about how Stick Man was used by each character. Our writing focus this week was on remembering to use capital letters and full stops correctly, as well as to read and check their own writing along the way!



Most excitedly, the children started their recorder lessons this week. We have started by listening to instrumentals created just by recorders and then some accompanied by other instruments. The children are very keen to bring their recorders home this weekend and start practising how to hold and blow a 'tu' sound into the recorder.

We will start teaching the notes next week, but we're aware that the children are excited about their new recorders and want to play with them this weekend first.

## Assemblies, Collective Worship and Reflection


This week's assembly theme has been Responsibility. On Monday, we used the Creation story from Genesis 1 (read from the Lion Storyteller Bible) to think about God's responsibility for creating our world and everything on it. We also thought about His responsibility for guiding us to be the best people we can be by following the examples of Jesus and other Biblical leaders.

The song *Think of a world without any flowers* reminded us how lucky we are and that we need to be thankful for all the wonderful things in our world.

## News from Peacock Class (Year 3)

We have returned with the same hard working approach as before half term, only this week with more enthusiasm as we are not quite so jaded following the half term's rest.

This week we have continued our unit of maths work on length and perimeter. On Tuesday we



focussed on converting measurements between cm and mm, using our understanding of dividing and multiplying by 10 to help. We further developed our equivalent work by converting between cm, m and mm. Other measuring work involved addition of lengths and finding the difference between lengths to work out how much shorter or longer items were than each other. Measurement and length will continue again next week.

We had a go at this challenge, the children thought it would be fun for you to have a go at home!


In English, we have continued our thinking about instructions by including the features we had identified in our own writing. We needed to ensure that each instruction had an imperative verb, adverbs, sequential language, a conjunction, and that the sentence was clear so that the instruction could be followed. We will be editing our instructions next week.

In topic work, we have looked at the Egyptian gods, and there are many. There are gods for gods, some gods have two names, some gods have two identities, and some gods come back to life

before becoming another god. We have had to think carefully and focus so that we do not become too muddled. To help us be sure about our god facts we have each chosen just four gods to gather information on from a variety of sources, therefore we have needed to use all of our




research skills.
Once our research had been collected, we started on our 'lift the flap 'charts about our gods.



In PSHE we continued our work on valuing difference in society. We have identified and discussed different groups and ethnicity including shared histories, family origins, cultures and traditions. We also explored common stereotypes and people's reactions to coming across

someone different through reading and discussing The Three

Monsters book.



Our adopted donkey is happy in the early Spring sunshine, and sent us a Valentine's card with a little news from his friends.

Days out: many of the children have enjoyed sharing their trips and visits to various museums with me. They seem to have really enjoyed their experiences. I did venture to Swaffham museum. For a small town museum, it is very good, but I would suggest not worth a dedicated trip. However, should you find yourself in the town or just passing through then it is worth popping in.

## News from Swift Class (Year 4)

This week as part of our topic work, we have been looking at the difference between physical maps and political maps. We are also becoming more familiar with the location of countries in the continent of Europe.

In Science children have been examining the seven life processes in order to determine if something is alive. Some children have programmed a camera to take a picture of some daffodils in the classroom every hour for a week and merged them together in a time lapse to see if plants move in any way, as movement is one of the seven life processes. We also finished our study of electrical circuits and drawing neat electrical diagrams.

Our maths lessons are concentrating on the subject of division, which is the inverse of multiplication. Please ask your child to tell you what multiplication they are working on and if they don't know or can't remember I am happy for you or them to ask me. I will be sending a letter shortly explaining how we are approaching the memorisation of times tables and how you can help support this at home. Being able to recall these will free up memory when dealing with more complex mathematical problems in the future.



Mrs How worked with us on Wednesday morning and showed us this maths game from the BBC Bitesize site. 

## News from Heron Class (Year 5)

It was lovely to welcome the children back this week and to hear everyone's news about what they had been getting up to over the half term break. We have jumped straight back into learning and in Maths this week we have finished off our fractions unit with a quick assessment to measure progress and then started on our next topic, which is multiplication. All the hard work that you have been putting in at home to speed up the recall of your children's times tables facts for our weekly Tackling Tables tests is paying off and we are seeing an increasing number of children with the fast and accurate recall that is so essential to success with this new maths topic. Ask your child to explain to you the new 'grid' method that we worked on to help us multiply...

In English, we are getting to work on a new genre - Myths and Legends. We spent some time looking at the Roman myth of Romulus and Remus, examined the structure of myths, and noticed that they typically contain more than one dilemma that needs to be resolved before the story concludes. We also concentrated on creating and spelling nouns using the suffix –ity in our spelling lesson on Monday. On that note, a big 'Thank you' to all of you who have been encouraging your children to use Spelling Frame regularly. We have noticed a much-improved engagement with this aspect of weekly homework and we are grateful for your help.

In Science his week, we have been rounding off our Space topic by thinking about gravity. We discussed the difference between mass and weight and carried out an experiment with Newton meters and measuring scales to see if we could find a relationship between the two measurements.

We rose to a timed Design Technology challenge on Tuesday which resulted in the creation of a fantastic display of Roman shields – each one unique and carefully thought out. They are currently on display in our cloakroom but will be coming home soon along with some clay

Roman coins.

There were more challenges in PE as we worked in teams with hoops and balloons to problem solve and we also worked on our fitness with some running, trying hard to pace ourselves. Over the coming weeks we will be working on some orienteering skills prior to our visit to Grafham.






## News from Puffin Class (Year 6)

In English our new topic, for the start of this half term, is about persuasive writing. We have already looked at examples of persuasive writing, fact and opinion, and on how to reverse plan a persuasive argument text.

This week, in Maths, we started our new topic on algebra. Some in the class found this challenging but with a lot of perseverance, many were happy when they achieved success in the lessons. Many also found this easier than they thought; we will continue to study this next week as well as looking at linear number sequences in the future.





In RE we have been working on units about other world religions. We have already studied a unit about Buddhism and the children learnt about the enlightened path and the festival of lights (Wesak). This term we have started a unit about Islam and the children will be learning about Tawhid and how the five pillars of Islam are so important to the Muslim faith. Please see the photos for some examples of the learning that we have done recently.

With the residential trip coming up in the middle of next month, please let us know if you have not received a kit list for the trip. You should have also received a Parentmail form asking for your consent to administer Calpol and

Piriton to your child if required; please remember to complete this. The children almost have made their menu and room choices this week.


