Head lice

Please note that staff have identified a number of cases of head lice around the school. Please could we ask you to check and treat your child/children as required.

The NHS advice is as follows:

Wet combing

Lice and nits can be removed by wet combing. You should try this method first. You can buy a special fine-toothed comb (detection comb) online or from pharmacies to remove head lice and nits. (The Nitty Gritty comb gets particularly good reviews)

There may be instructions on the pack, but usually you:

- wash hair with ordinary shampoo
- apply lots of conditioner (any conditioner will do)
- comb the whole head of hair, from the roots to the ends It usually takes about 10 minutes to comb short hair, and 20 to 30 minutes for long, frizzy or curly hair.

Do wet combing on days 1, 5, 9 and 13 to catch any newly hatched head lice. Check again that everyone's hair is free of lice on day 17.


News from Starling Class (Reception)

News from Robin Class (Year 1)

After another lovely week in class, and getting to see you all at Parents Evening this week, I think we are all in need of a weekend! The children have worked hard this week, and concentrated well despite some falling ill – or coming back to us feeling better.

We have looked at some super stories all about toys, which we will be looking at in more detail over the next few weeks. We have also been reviewing and consolidating all the sounds we have learned in Phonics over the last term.

We have been practising quick recall of our number bonds to 10 this week in Maths, and have started thinking about how we might tackle working out doubles (from 'just knowing' 3 + 3 to working out 8 + 8 by counting on, or doubling 5 and then the 3 to considering how we might double 14); and moving on to thinking about 'near-doubles' ($7 + 8 \rightarrow$ we could double 7 and add 1, or double 8 and take away 1, depending on which double we know more confidently). We played some games with a partner to help us get faster, too, which everyone enjoyed.

With Mrs Andrews, the children have been weighing and working practically to compare capacity, using a variety of containers and the water tray. This is always a popular and fun Maths area, with many ways to extend this learning at home – think bath time, washing up bowls and mixing coloured liquids. These areas of learning are also nicely consolidated in cooking activities, if you feel so inclined! Please do share photos of mixing, weighing, pouring and measuring – we really would love to see their learning in action!

In Science, we thought about the material one of our toys is made from, then also thought how we could make it better by changing the material! It was a lot of fun to then think



about the kinds of materials we could change them to, to make them worse!! Spikey metal dolls and glass cars would indeed be much worse and we don't think many children would like them! In RE this week, the children have started to think about the question, "Why is Easter so important to Christians?" We started by thinking what the children already know about Easter, if the children knew anything that Christians believe about Easter or any questions the children had around the question. We had a discussion about how what we believe might differ from what Christians believe, and how we should phrase our own beliefs as we learn about other faiths.

In PE this week, the children have learned a fun new 'warm-up' game, which involved lots of bottom-shuffling and team-work and used skipping ropes and hoops to skip – or make steps to improve this, and the ribbons to think about making shapes using their gross motor skills. Lots of smiles on Tuesday morning, especially as we also had the wall bars and climbing ropes out again.

The children have learned about the sorts of toys children in the past would make for themselves. These toys were often simple and cheap to make. This week, they have had great fun designing their own peg polls, which they will hopefully make in D&T with Mrs Andrews next week.

Next week is National Science Week and as such we will be completing a couple of investigations with the children – more info (and hopefully photos!) in next week's Star!

We all hope you have a great weekend!


Assemblies, Collective Worship and Reflection

News from Owl Class (Year 2)

We've had another busy week in Owl class this week and the children have worked hard on a variety of activities. In our Maths work, we have continued our work on measurement. We've been looking at scales measuring a volume of liquid in litres or millilitres, and we have been thinking about the Maths we would need to use to solve problems, e.g. 'Sam pours 3 two litre bottles into a bucket. What is the total volume of water in the bucket? Which number sentences could we write? (E.g. 2+2+2=6 litres or 3x2=6 litres.) We've also been measuring temperature in 'degrees Celsius' and have practised reading a scale to see what the temperature is, as well as working out what the temperature will be, if it rises for example by 25° C or falls by 3° C.

Our English work has continued to centre around Julia Donaldson books and the 'Stick Man' story in particular. This week we have planned the middle and end of a story based around our own 'Twig Child' character. The beginning of our story started with Twig Child going for a walk with his family, then finding himself lost and in our playground! He found himself falling into the hood of a little girl and ending up in Owl Class, where he faced a range of problems such as being mistaken for a pencil and put in a pencil pot. The children thought of some more problems Twig Child could face, as well as how the main problem was eventually going to be resolved and how Twig Child finally managed to get back to his family again.







In our Topic work this week we've been reading and learning some facts about historical figures such as Queen Elizabeth I, and in the weeks ahead, we will be learning about more significant individuals such as Samuel Pepys, Florence Nightingale and Mary Seacole.

Just a little reminder that our P.E days are Mondays and Wednesdays, so your child will need a full P.E kit in school (for both outdoor P.E and indoor P.E) on these days. If your child has long hair please could it be tied back on P.E days too – thank you.


























News from Peacock Class (Year 3)

Yes, yet another hard working week.

In Maths, we started our work on fractions by understanding the denominator of a unit fraction, comparing and ordering unit fractions and understanding the numerator of a non-unit fraction.

- The denominator is the number at the bottom, and tells us how many equal pieces the whole has been made into
- A unit fraction is when the number on the top is 1
- The number on top is called the numerator, and tells us how many of the equal pieces we have
- A non-unit fractions, is a fraction with more than one as its numerator. eg ³/₄

In English, we have begun our work on the Egyptian myth Isis and Osiris. This is one of the versions of the story:

The ancient Egyptians believed that when a person was crowned Pharaoh (or King) of Egypt, they also became a god.

Osiris was a popular king because he was wise and kind. He was also the god of farming, and the people prayed to him in the hope that they would have good crops each

year.

Osiris had a brother called Seth, who was god of storms. Seth was very jealous of Osiris, because Osiris was more important than him so he made an evil plan to kill Osiris.

Seth built a beautiful chest and then threw a lavish party, with lots of food and drink for the guests. At the party, Seth promised that whoever fitted into the chest perfectly would get to keep it. Nobody knew however, that Seth had secretly made the chest the perfect size for Osiris.

At the party, everyone wanted to own the chest so they all had a go at getting in it, to see if it would fit them. When Osiris tried it, he found that it fitted him perfectly.

"Look Seth" Osiris said, "the chest fits me perfectly". "So it does" replied his brother with a smile, "so you shall live in it for ever".

With that, Seth killed Osiris with his sword and cut him into lots of pieces. He put all the pieces into the chest, slammed the lid closed and threw it into the River Nile.

When Isis (who was Osiris' wife) discovered what had happened at the party, she was heartbroken. She sent her slaves to look along the banks of the River Nile for the chest containing her husband's body so that she could give him a proper funeral. A few days later, the slaves returned with the chest, but to Isis' horror the lid was missing and the pieces of Osiris' body had gone. Isis decided that she would have to hunt for the sections of her husband's body herself.

Isis travelled throughout Egypt, and met lots of people. Some were helpful and let her stay with them, but others were mean and told her ies. In some places she was lucky and she found a part of her husband's body, but in other places, she found nothing.



Having searched for a year and a day, Isis was at last successful. She had

found the last piece of her husband's body. She went to Giza, where her husband was placed into a grand sarcophagus. Then, she was finally able to give him a proper funeral. Lots of the people who had been at the party came and they watched and said prayers as Osiris was carried into his step pyramid. Although she was very sad because her husband had died, Isis was satisfied that she had given him a proper funeral. Shortly afterwards, Osiris became god of the underworld.

That ends the story of Osiris and Isis, but there is one person we have forgotten. What happened to the evil brother, Seth? Well, he was caught and found guilty. As his punishment, the ancient Egyptians made him carry the boat that held the sun across the sky forever.

So far, we have identified what makes a myth a myth, and planned the journey that Isis will face in order to find her husband's body parts. We have had a go at writing sentences using adverbs to describe how Isis travelled, and written sentences using expanded noun phrases to describe the places she visited. This myth will be the focus of our English work until Easter.

In topic work, we have been looking at the sculptures of Antony Gormley and Henry Moore; we have used their work to influence our own when making a sculpture of an Egyptian god. So far, we have discussed a selection of the sculptors' work, discussed our thoughts, likes and dislikes about them and made a maquette (a test sculpture) in the style of each. Once our sculptures are finished, we are hoping to display them outside school as part of the Mordens Art Trail.

In RE we have learnt about the Hindu festival of Holi. We also continued our explanation of how Hindu parents help children to understand karma through the Panchatantra tales.

It was lovely to see so many of you for parent consultation and to share the children's achievements thus far.

You should have received a letter regarding the trip to Burghley House via Parentmail. Please make payments by the date given; I know it seems early but there is rather a lot of admin and paperwork required all with early deadlines. If these are not met, the visit could be jeopardised.

News from Swift Class (Year 4)

This week as part of our recount writing in English lessons, we have been learning about punctuating speech. This is where it is helpful sometimes to 'read as a writer' and discuss with your child the conventions for writing speech in the books that they are reading. Taking the time to notice the rules and patterns that you would not normally pick up when reading for pleasure. For example, a new speaker for a new line and the punctuation lying within the inverted commas.

As part of discussions during parent's evening, I mentioned to some parents the thinking blocks website and thought it may be useful to share with everyone. This uses the concepts of bar models (something we use extensively at Steeple Morden) to help give children a way in to understand what maths needs to be done when tackling multi step word problems.

News from Heron Class (Year 5)

It has been another week packed full of learning in Year 5. In Maths, we have continued with our work on the compact method when multiplying numbers together and have now also begun to talk about the relationship between multiplication and division. We used our prior knowledge of factors and multiples to help us to divide numbers leaving remainders. More work on division will follow next week when we will test out a range of different calculation methods.

Our work in English on myths and legends has continued. We wrote some fantastic descriptions of the hero/heroine in our myths, remembering to include descriptive language using expanded noun phrases and similes. The class were very keen to share their inventive examples. We then moved on to write the conflict part of our myth and we realised what a lot of different features we need to include. We again rose to the challenge and next week we will be able to share some excerpts with you here in the Star when we are happy with the finished result and we have completed all of our important editing with our 'purple polishing pens'.





In Science we learnt more about pollination of plants and in History we learnt more about the role of Boudicca and her revolt against the Roman invasion of Britain.



We have enjoyed meeting with you all this week and discussing your child's progress. The children enjoyed preparing their books for you to see and were proud of their progress so far since September. Keep up the good work Year 5!

News from Puffin Class (Year 6)

In English, we have planned, edited and written our persuasive leaflets about saving mountain gorillas (or another endangered species) from extinction. The children have used emotive and persuasive language and features to help people to understand the plight of these animals. We also made sure that we included examples of formal and informal writing, as well as using semi-colons; ask your child about these.

This week, in Maths, we have continued to study algebra and linear number sequences. The children worked hard on this, as they have faced some difficult challenges here – well done. Ask them about it at home.

In one of our weekly PE lessons, we are studying health and fitness. The children measured their pulse rate before and after a variety of different exercise and then recorded their scores. The intention is to use maths and science to draw and analyse their weekly scores



once we have completed the unit of work. Check out some of the photos of the class in action.
