## Transfer to Secondary Schoolapplications now open!

This is a reminder to parents/carers of all Year 6 pupils that you will need to apply for a place at Secondary school for your child. Applications are now open for September 2024 and will close on 31st October 2023. To apply for your child's place you will need to apply through the Local Authority to which you pay council tax (for most of you that will be Cambridgeshire County Council, in which case go to https://www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/ residents/children-and-families/schools-learning/apply-for-a-school-place/secondaryschool). Please note that Cambridgeshire County Council are not sending out letters as they have in previous years to remind you to apply.

Parents who make applications before the closing date of 31st October will receive their offer for a secondary place for their child on 1st March 2024. Any late applications received after $31^{\text {st }}$ October will be dealt with as 'late applications'. We encourage you to apply in good time to ensure the best chance of obtaining one of your 3 school preferences.

If you do not wish to apply online, then paper application forms are available on request if you call 03450451370.

If you have any questions about the application or online processes please refer to the Cambridgeshire County Council website or contact the Admissions Team.

## Playground

## News from Starling Class (Reception)

Hello from Starling Class!
This week the children have had an action packed week full of learning. In Phonics lesson the children revisited last week's learning of the graphemes $\mathbf{s}, \mathbf{a}, \mathbf{t}, \mathbf{p}$ and the Harder To Read and Spell word a. This week the children learnt three new Harder To Read and Spell words I, the, no. We have been extremely impressed with the level of engagement from all families with regards to regular if not daily Phonics and reading practice, please keep it up because the children are thriving and their confidence is shining through!

The children built on last week's learning of the numbers 1,2 and 3 this week and were introduced to Numberblock 4 . We learnt that 4 is a square number, 4 is one more than 3 and we thought about how to answer 'how many' questions and the process we need to follow.
We saw some excellent independent Maths exploring during COOL Time with lots of the children exploring five frames for the first time whilst trying to represent 4. We have also seen a whole array of different representations of the Numberblocks characters!


We continued our 'word collecting' work this week with the words below to build on our ambitious vocabulary. We even heard a child explain how "ravenous" they were before lunchtime, which was brilliant as they were applying their word knowledge from last week!

This week we had our first mini fire alarm practice where the children learnt what to do if the fire alarm went off. We went on a search around the school to see if we could spot any fire exit signs too! We had our first RE lesson where we met Tom and Tessa and they showed us their precious treasures and some of them were Christian objects which lots of us were able to identify. We then discussed going to Church and we were impressed with the children's knowledge about the locations of our local churches! Another first this week was our Science lesson where we discussed autumn,
 sharing the facts we already knew about autumn and then we went on a Science discovery walk to spot any early signs of autumn, which in turn prompted fantastic conversations about taking care in nature. In PSHE the children were thinking about how they can work and play well with others in class, we thought being polite, turn taking and sharing were the most important things to remember! In Music with Mrs. Brown, the children listened to 'Happy' by Pharrell Williams and they were able to identify a variety of different instruments within the
 song.

Thank you so much to those of you who have sent in family photographs. We are still waiting for lots of them to come in to create our family book. Please bring them in at your earliest convenience.

## News from Robin Class (Year 1)

The children had a great time on Monday and Tuesday afternoons mapping all of our body parts and answering the question 'Am I my muscles?' and 'Am I my guts and stuff?' As staff, we were impressed by their knowledge and enjoyed their enthusiasm. There were a few laughs (together!) about where some organs had been placed and between us we have written a super list of what they want to find out with regard to how their bodies work. In addition to all of this, our Robins have
 shown kindness, adaptability and friendship in abundance this week, as well as resilience and bravery. You should all be proud of your lovely young people.

We have all been impressed with the writing skills demonstrated this week with all the children writing their own "That's not my..." book. Words have been available to use as prompts, children have sounded out their own choices of words and improvements have been made to letter-formation skills (although some need continued support). All your children were able to say what they wanted to write and tried their very best.

During our maths lessons this week, the children have been able to demonstrate their ability to 'count on' and say what is 'one more than' a given number. Do support your children in being able to do this by asking them to count from any number you might say to them (and then try counting backwards, too). Some children have also been working on some reasoning problems - What is the mistake we have made? How do you know? These children have shown good verbal skills at explaining their knowledge and putting what they understand into practice.


If you have not yet returned your signed data sheet (yellow sheet which came home last week) PLEASE return it to the front desk as soon as possible even if it is just signed and everything on it remain the same! Our lovely staff will be so happy to see them back so as to update or confirm if your data is the same.

Thank you for your continued support in all you do with your children at home from asking them to listen to you, to practising reading skills to providing them with a water bottle every day. Ensuring your child knows they have all the right things for their day really does help them feel secure at school.

## Assemblies \& Collective Worship

Our whole school assemblies are continuing with the theme of parables. We have revisited the parable of the Lost Sheep (Matthew 18, v12-14) which underpins our school ethos. The concept of rejoicing when something that has been lost is found or when someone who has made a poor choice is able to reflect and make a change is something that we can all relate to. In the same way that the shepherd in this parable represents how God treats those who are 'lost' we also compare this to how we treat each other in school.


## News from Owl Class (Year 2)

Yet another good week in Owl class, lots of learning, some factual writing and our heads are wrapped around number lines.

In Maths this week we have been continuing with our topic of place value. We have learnt about position of number. The children enjoyed being a number and working out their position on a child-built number line. The children learnt key vocabulary such as start point, end point and intervals and can now confidently label number lines with intervals worth 10 or 1. Finally, the children built on their understanding of tens and ones and used this to estimate missing numbers up to 100. As every week, we looked at our times tables and this week we introduced the 5 times table. Please support your child with this at home.

In English this week we have written our non-chronological report. It has encouraged stamina and perseverance but all the children should feel very proud of their outcomes. On Tuesday we spent time researching each chosen animal and note taking facts. Then we got straight on and wrote our titles, introduction and expanded noun phrase all in one session. Remembering to use technical language, the children recorded three sections of superb facts the following day ending with an exclamation. Ask your child about the animal facts they know; I am sure some will surprise you!

Our animal knowledge has continued in science this week as we learnt about the basic survival needs of animals and humans. It was lovely to hear the initial responses from the children of what they couldn't live without: "my parents" came up frequently as well as "my dog", "my iPad" and "my favourite dinner".

We continued learning about the world in geography and what the points on a compass represent and how we can describe the world using directional language.

Europe is to the west of Asia.
Antarctica is the most southern continent.
Africa is to the east of the Atlantic Ocean.

## News from Peacock Class (Year 3)

Another busy, fun and productive week in Year Three!
In English, we have started our work on foxes, this has involved us identifying the features of an information board, and being information hunter-gatherers. To be an information huntergatherer, we needed to work in groups. One person went and read facts about foxes and returned to the group to report one discovered fact, and one member of the group would write the fact down, while the remaining members created an action to help us remember the fact. Everyone took turns at each job. The most successful hunter-gatherers were those that could work in a cooperative group. Some of us found this easier than others, but we all realised that we had learnt a lot about foxes as well as how to work in a group. Next week we will continue our fox work in our fox groups.


We also started our work on foxes, by sorting statements into 'true', 'could be true' or 'false'. For each statement, we had to explain the reasons behind our choices. Next week we will continue gathering information to create an information board all about foxes.

In Maths, we have continued developing our understanding of place value, by ordering numbers and solving mysteries of missing numbers. Next week we will use our understanding of place value to help with addition and subtraction work.

In other lessons, we have been developing our geographical knowledge by thinking about maps and mapping. We identified all the key features of a map. We then drew a map using all the features. Our maps were of our imaginary landscapes for the setting of Fantastic Mr Fox. We also impressed Miss Smith with how much we knew about urban and rural settings, adding to our understanding by finding out about how
 foxes can live in these two settings, and how they adapt their way of life for what the setting has to offer.

- Mathletics and Spelling Frame are up and ready with set work for the children, logins for both are in reading diaries
- Tackling tables practise.

## News from Swift Class (Year 4)

In our recent Science lessons, we have gained further insights into the makeup of sound by learning about the causes of changes in pitch and volume - no musical instruments were harmed!

In our English lessons, with various props for inspiration, such as hats and walking sticks we have been developing characters. These hands-on activities have allowed children to explore the vocabulary and details needed to build characters through the thoughtful selection of adjectives.

We have been honing our skills with numbers in the ten thousands in our maths lessons. The children have been working diligently to ensure they can accurately place these numbers in relation to each other on a number line.

For those early birds who love an active start to the day, we're excited to say running club has begun. It takes place every Tuesday morning from $8 \mathrm{am}, \mathrm{Mrs}$. Weddepohl and I will be leading this and we want to emphasize that the club is designed to cater to all speeds, ensuring that every child can participate comfortably. There are a handful of places left so if your child is willing and you would like to sign your child up for the Running Club, please make the $£ 11$ payment for the term via ParentMail.

## News from Heron Class (Year 5)

It has been a busy week in Year 5 across the curriculum.

In English, we have continued with our work on 'Street Child' and also worked hard to try and complete the full set of baseline assessments in both spelling and phonics so we are completely confident that we have accurately identified any gaps or weaknesses your child may have in these areas that we will
 work on this year.

We identified the features of a playscript in a text (eg, a cast list, a new line when a new character speaks, each name is followed by a colon, speech is written without inverted commas etc). We also learnt how to use brackets to insert extra information into a sentence. We learnt that we always need a pair of brackets. Inside the brackets is the extra information. The rest of the sentence would still make sense without it. This extra information is often called 'parenthesis.' Here are some examples:-

Sophie's toy bunny (who was eleven and had brown fur) loved to kayak.
Ralph's bear (who had a ginger beard) loved to play Minecraft.
Harlee's dog (who had a long tongue) loved to play board games.
In Science, following on from our work on the life cycle of mammals, we have now begun to think about the life cycle of birds. We have started to compare the similarities and differences between these two life cycles and represented our ideas on Venn diagrams.

In Maths, we have continued our work on place value by comparing and ordering numbers to $1,000,000$. We have also learnt how to round numbers to the nearest 10,100 or 1,000 . This was tricky as we needed to apply our knowledge of place value but also we needed to be very efficient in our counting in multiples of 10 . Rounding will be the Mathletics activity for this week to reinforce this concept.

Please also look out for the separate notice about Tackling Tables (see page 5) if you need to purchase a home pack of cards to help with practising multiplication tables at home.


In R.E. we have thought about how different groups of Christians view the creation story in
 Genesis and considered which of these viewpoints sit more or less comfortably alongside scientific theories of creation.
