#### Message from Mrs How:

Thank you to everyone who was able to join our Year Ahead meetings. Teachers enjoyed being able to put faces to names and, in some cases reconnect with parents of past pupils. Hopefully you found the sessions useful and informative. For parents who were unable to attend, a hard copy of the document/presentation will be sent home. As always, if you have any questions or queries please contact the teacher via the school office.

Another thank you goes to those parents who completed our Family Questionnaire at the end of last term. All responses and comments will be shared with governors so that we can continue to make necessary and appropriate improvements to the school. We also carried out our annual Pupil Questionnaire in July and are working through the responses there. Sadly, we are not going to be able to build a water park on the field, and much as we might enjoy a longer weekend that is not an option either. Having said that, some of the comments and suggestions from the children were very insightful and useful.

The vast majority of parents feel their child is happy at school (94%) and well looked after (98%). The number of children who say they are happy here is slightly lower but explained in many cases by comments such as "it's not about being here – I don't want to be at any school". 92% of parent respondents said they were confident that if their child had a problem, there is someone they can go to in school, who will listen to them. 82% of children said there was an adult in school they would go to, with many explaining that they would prefer to talk to a friend, parent or other trusted adult (this was more common in older pupils). The percentage of parents who say they find the The Star or website useful has increased as has the percentage who feel that we provide appropriate opportunities for children to pray or reflect should they wish.

One area where responses continue to vary is that of homework. Some parents would like more, others would like less and some people want none at all. We try to take a measured approach by asking that children are supported to practise basic skills of reading, spelling and number facts (including times tables) and then offering optional activities that families can take up if they would like. Regular practise in those basic skills makes such a difference to a child's progress, confidence and sense of success so one final thank you to everyone who is able to find a few moments in a busy day to help with this.



# Transfer to Secondary School—applications now open!

This is a reminder to parents/carers of all Year 6 pupils that you will need to apply for a place at Secondary school for your child. Applications are now open for September 2024 and will close on 31st October 2023. To apply for your child's place you will need to apply through the Local Authority to which you pay council tax (for most of you that will be Cambridgeshire County Council, in which case go to https://www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/ residents/children-and-families/schoolslearning/apply-for-a-school-place/secondaryschool). Please note that Cambridgeshire County Council are not sending out letters as they have in previous years to remind you to apply.

Parents who make applications before the closing date of 31st October will receive their offer for a secondary place for their child on 1st March 2024. Any late applications received after 31st October will be dealt with as 'late applications'. We encourage you to apply in good time to ensure the best chance of obtaining one of your 3 school preferences.

If you do not wish to apply online, then paper application forms are available on request if you call 0345 045 1370.

If you have any questions about the application or online processes please refer to the Cambridgeshire County Council website or contact the Admissions Team.

# Playground

Parents are asked to ensure that their children, whether those who attend school or younger siblings, do not play in the gazebo or on the play structure at school pick up time. # News from Starling Class (Reception)

#### Hello from Starling Class!

This week the children have had their first full week of teaching and learning. The learnt their first four phonemes and had a go at writing the graphemes. It was so exciting to see how enthusiastic the children were at demonstrating their knowledge independently during COOL Time.

The children enjoyed their first week of Maths lessons and we have been exploring the world of 1, 2 and 3. The children met the Numberblocks and were fantastic number detectives listing the numerous ways they saw the numbers 1, 2 and 3 represented. The children were

brilliant at demonstrating their reasoning skills as they sorted pictures into two groups such as "3" and "not 3".

We began our first foray into the world of word collecting this week. We were inspired by the book by Peter H Reynolds 'The word collector'. Each day we begin with a new word of the day to increase our vocabulary. I am informed that some children have been "blowing you away" with their intelligent vocabulary this week! The children have been attempting to use some of the words during the course of the day which has been lovely to hear.



Word	Meaning

The children have also been busy in PSHE thinking about things they have learnt already and set goals relating to things they would like to learn next. In Music, the children listened to 'Celebration' by Kool and the Gang and responded to it thinking about the different instruments they could hear, if they enjoyed the song, how it made them feel then learnt and performed the song pat-a-cake.

Next week we are going to have our first RE, Science, DT and Computing lessons as well as building on our Phonics and Maths learning from this week. On Friday the children will have changed their Library books, have their first book with words sent home, have their first Harder To Read and Spell word and their first four graphemes to practice at home. These will all be updated every Friday, please help us to ensure regular practice happens and that they are all kept safely in the book bags when not in use.

# News from Robin Class (Year 1)

This week your children have been great at exploring language. They were able to generate lots of super adjectives to describe how different materials and fabrics felt or sounded. This was in preparation for writing their own 'That's not my...' book, which

we will be completing next week in our English lessons.

On Monday, they were also able to sort different objects in Science, according to which material they were made of. Discussions were had around things like clothes pegs and scissors, where two materials were visible. Mrs Brown enjoyed her day with them.



We have continued thinking about 'Am I My Stuff?' this

week, which children discussing many different things they could do with their belongings when they grow out of them, or they don't play with them any more. Obviously we encouraged them to ask you first!

In Maths this week, we have been listening carefully to the language used to identify smaller numbers, with children thinking carefully HOW they know how many counters are in a 10-frame, talking about their knowledge of number bonds within 10 and counting accurately a group of cubes placed randomly. This has been a great base from

which we can leap next week.

You should have received a data sheet this week from the office (in children's bags on Thursday afternoon) Please do send this sheet back with any necessary changes on Monday next week if you haven't returned it already!

Thank you for continuing to send in water bottles. A coat every day is also needed now that the weather is so changeable. We endeavour to take the children outside every play and lunch time even if it is raining a little so that they can run around and get some fresh air.

Sorry we didn't get to change Library books on Wednesday this week – we tried to get as many as possible done on Thursday and will return to Wednesday next week!



# News from Owl Class (Year 2)


Another very busy week in year 2 full of enthusiasm, resilience and new learning.

In English this week we have explored the features of a chronological report in more depth and the children started to write their own excerpts of each feature. In doing so the children have learnt new vocabulary; expanded noun phrase, technical language and introduction. Finding ways to remember the definitions proved an interesting game and gave an insight to how your child's mind works! Through some interesting methods the definitions were learnt well and the children recorded some fabulous examples.



In Maths this week we have been developing our knowledge of place value further and learnt not only how to partition numbers but how to flexibly partition them. We can

understand where the tens and ones are in a number, but can also understand what the tens are made up of. For example we know 45 is made up of 40 and 5 but it is also made up of 30 and 15, 20 and 25, 10 and 35. We spent a couple of lessons this week really getting to grips with this knowledge unbundling straws in ten. Can you find all the flexible partitions of 67?





Thank you for your best efforts in returning reading books on time, this allows for a smooth transition to a new book coming home. Please note your child will receive a 'bead in the jar' working toward a class treat if they achieve four reads at home. The more home reads = more beads for the jar. Please ensure to record in the reading log any reading completed at home.


As your ears may have heard the children have learnt a new geographical song to help learning the seven continents and five oceans. On Wednesday the class all worked together to complete a

world map puzzle and the humming of the song created a buzz in the room.

Puzzles were a theme this week, the children also completed life cycle puzzles in science. The understanding of the human lifecycle was a high discussion point but I am pleased to say the whole class now know after teenagers you're not just elderly!

# News from Peacock Class (Year 3)

Another busy, fun and productive week in Year Three!

In English, we have changed our notes about Roald Dahl into text, we have thought about using extended sentences through the use of conjunctions and the use of pronouns to prevent repetition of nouns! We are very pleased with what we have managed to write so far.

We are all in agreement that Roald Dahl was a very clever writer, he used so many of his own life experiences to give him ideas for his stories and characters. Next week we will edit our work and produce our final pieces of work, and begin our work on foxes.






In Maths, we have further developed our understanding of place value, by working out what is 100, 10 or 1 more or less than a given number. This understanding has then been applied to solving problems and writing statements using < or >. Place value work will continue again next week.

In other lessons, we have designed our own writing huts. In order to do this we had to think carefully about what we would need around us and why, where the hut would be and why as well as the atmosphere we would want to create in order to feel comfortable and inspired to write.

With Miss Smith, in our music lessons, we thought about the pulse of a piece of music and had a go at learning our first song. Eventually we

are hoping to be able to perform our song to a lucky select audience.





#### Weekly home activities

- Mathletics and Spelling Frame are up and ready with set work for the children, logins for both are in reading diaries
- Following our spelling assessment this week, we will use the next few weeks to consolidate the spelling of the year 2 common exception words before embarking on the year 3/4 list. If you have successfully completed the spelling frame activities and would like an extra challenge, please start to look at the year 3/4 words, that can be found in the centre pages of reading diaries.
- Tackling tables practise.
- Homework will be discussed in more detail in the Year Ahead meeting.

# News from Swift Class (Year 4)

It's been an exciting week in Swift Class as we took part in our first swimming lesson offsite.

In English we have been exploring sentence expansion and how authors develop character. We've been emphasising the importance of using appropriate adjectives to enrich

sentences in order to paint vivid pictures with words. This not only enhances descriptive writing but also makes children's storytelling more engaging.

We've been exploring how authors build characters in stories. Using the book "Max and the Millions" as our guide, we've delved into the techniques authors employ to create multi-dimensional and relatable characters.

In Maths we have been continuing to expand the value of the numbers children work with, we are now working with numbers in the ten-thousands. Understanding how many tens and hundreds make up these numbers in the ten thousands, this helps to build a solid foundation for more complex mathematical concepts in later years.

We have been learning about drawing figures in proportion in our art lessons and have been trying to improve with each attempt annotating our work as we go.

Thank you for ensuring your children came prepared for their first swimming lesson. The first week primarily focused on assessing each child's current swimming abilities. This information will help us tailor the teaching approach to accommodate a wide range of skill levels over the coming weeks.

For those of you who were able to visit our classroom this week to learn about the areas we'll be focusing on this year, thank you for attending. If you were unable to attend, a

paper copy of the information has been sent home with your child, and you can also find a digital copy on our class web page for reference.

# News from Heron Class (Year 5)

In English, we have continued with our work on 'Street Child', focusing this week on predicting what might happen next (using clues from the text) and also empathising with some of the main characters and trying to imagine how we would feel if we were in their situation. The children have impressed us by sharing some very thoughtful ideas. We have also started to read examples of play scripts as



this is the first genre that we will study this year. The unit of work will hopefully conclude with us writing our own play scripts, set in Victorian Britain, and possibly even performing them.

In Science, following on from our work on the life cycle of mammals we have begun to think about one particular mammal, humans. We have discussed the changes that occur in human beings as they develop to old age. We have begun to compare generalised examples of cognitive, physical and emotional changes in every stage of the human life cycle.

In Maths, we have used our work on Roman numerals as a way in to thinking in more depth about place value, in particular representing numbers to 1,000,000. A sound understanding of place value is fundamental to making progress in maths and that is why we start with this topic every year. We have represented numbers on place value charts with counters and also placed numbers on number lines.

In our Art lesson this week we continued to look at the work of William Morris, pointing out key features of his work. We will soon be designing our own pieces that we will be able to replicate in press print.

The class enjoyed learning about how times have changed for children since the Victorian era. We learnt about what it might have been like to work as a chimney sweep, a street sweeper, in a factory or in a coal mine. This linked well with our work on 'Street Child.'



Thank you to everyone who was able to attend the Year Ahead meeting on Thursday after school. It was lovely to meet you and we look forward to working with you to make this a successful year for your child.

## News from Puffin Class (Year 6)

This week, we have been continuing to look at place value in Maths and numbers up to 10,000,000 before we moved on to rounding numbers up to a million (and beyond in some cases). We then looked at negative numbers and investigated football league tables and the temperatures in arctic Canada and Siberian Russia. Ask your child about this and check out some of the examples of the work attached. The Mathletics homework that is set weekly

tries to reflect and consolidate on our learning in class so please make sure that the homework is completed.

In English, we are continuing with our topic on newspaper reports, focussing on the outbreak of the Great War and the causes and consequences of this. We are now looking at various newspaper reports and the features that would be expected to be found within them.

In other subjects we are studying the biology of living things in Science; World War One in History; God in RE and Turner's paintings in Art. In

Computing we will be using spreadsheets and in PSHE we are studying rights and responsibilities. Finally in PE we are playing netball and tennis.

Thank you to all those who attended the Year Ahead meeting on Wednesday. I hope you found this informative. Please e-mail in any questions to the office that you may have and I will endeavour to answer them.

The children who completed the play leader course whilst in Year 5 have now begun to put their training into use as they started to deliver their weekly rota of activities last week. They seem to be enjoying leading and organising games and activities for the

younger children.

Homework will continue to be set on a Friday and should be completed by the following Thursday.




