\* For sickness and/or diarrhea it is essential to keep your child away from school **until 48 hours after the last episode of diarrhoea/vomiting**. These sorts of bugs can be transmitted very easily, particularly in school settings. We do encourage lots of hand-washing in school and would ask you to follow this at home, as well. Please remember if your child is unwell they will be much more comfortable at home with a parent or carer who can look after them much more closely than we can in school.

## News from Starling Class (Reception)

This week we have been building on our knowledge of Knights and dragons from last week and have extended it to other fairytale and royal characters and creatures. We have had some wonderful independent simile writing, descriptive sentences, labelling of body parts (of dragons) and we've even been designing our own family coat of arms. In Maths the children moved away from thinking about counting on (addition) and began to practice counting back (subtraction). They enjoyed playing games inside and outside using dice, bean bags and number tracks as well as simple board games.

In Phonics this half term we will be focusing on previously learnt graphemes which as a class we are unsure of or get confused by. This has given the children great confidence this week in their spelling of words and ability to decode unknown words with those unfamiliar graphemes. This week we have focused our attention on **h**, **j**, **v**, **y** and the digraph **ch**. Feel free to revisit these phonemes at home with your child and use your grapheme cards to build words containing those sounds e.g. ch-i-p.

During our first handwriting session this week the children practiced their long ladder letters. These are the letters that are lovely and straight. We reminded the children that we always begin our letters at the top, some letters are short (a, c, e, i, m, n, o, r, s, u, v, w, x, z), have ascenders (b, d, h, k, l, t) or descenders (f, g, j, p, q, y). We teach the children about letter families, long ladders, curly caterpillars, one armed robots and zig-zag monster letters and we will also be looking at writing the capital versions of the same letter families. Please find below the letter patter to help with the formation of the long ladder letters at home.

We have several governor visits planned this year, some have already taken place with the rest being this term to monitor progress on the curriculum and the school's development plan. So far, we can see that a lot of the hard work that has gone into developing and enhancing the curriculum since our latest Ofsted visit is really coming to fruition.

We have been fortunate to recruit quite a few more governors over the past year as well as our recent advert for a parent governor which will be announced shortly. Here is a brief introduction to some of our latest members:

My name is Mark Arnold and I live in Steeple and can be seen each morning walking my Black Labrador, Flo, up to the church and around the fields. I moved to the village approximately fifteen years ago, my Daughter, Son-In-Law & granddaughter live in Litlington. I am an Accountant by profession, working for a small independent pharmaceutical company. After seeing an advertisement, I decided that I could use my experience of finance, organisation and administration to make a contribution to the village that I enjoy living in.

Having a thriving local school, delivering strong education is important for everyone, and now that my own children have all left school, I look forward to using my knowledge, skills and experience, helping the team at Steeple Morden Primary.

My name is Victoria, I have three children and my eldest is in Year 1 at Steeple Morden Primary. I became a governor earlier this year and am a member of the curriculum team and supporting Early Years. I'm an Associate Professor at the University of Hertfordshire teaching and research in Pharmacy and involved with exam and standard setting nationally for trainee Pharmacists. I'm also co-founder, director and Chief Scientific Officer of a biotech company as a spin-out of my university research assessing inhalation toxicity without the use of animals.

## News from Robin Class (Year 1)

We have had an exciting week in Robin Class this week.

We have set up the incubator with 24 hen's eggs and have a job list set up to help us know how to look after them for the next three weeks. These jobs involve adding water to the incubator tray and turning the eggs. They are due to hatch during the week beginning 15<sup>th</sup> May, so do expect a lot of excitement around that time!!



We have planted potatoes this week. They had some shoots coming out of them and we have a variety of answers to the question "what do you think will happen?" including that maybe strawberry or tomato plants will grow... we will be sharing the responsibility of watering them and topping up the soil as they grow.

Sunflower seeds have also been planted. The children were able to decorate and name their own individual pot, which will come home in a couple of weeks - this

is able to be planted straight in the ground as there is no plastic in it at all. Hopefully there will be seedling news next week.

The children enjoyed getting outside for our 'circuits' lesson this week – they have all expressed the recognition that after practise they have improved their performance. We will add more 'stations' over the coming weeks and hopefully increase our general fitness and skill levels for these particular activities.

In Maths we have continued looking at 2-digit numbers, but have also started thinking about Multiplication. In Year One, this is counting in multiples of 2 and 10 and we will move on to counting in 5s. PLEASE check in with your child about how they are managing/feeling about this. They need to be able to count to at least 50 in these steps. When counting in 2s, many children are still struggling to be fluent counting beyond 10 or 12 and practise with you at home will help to embed their

understanding. Once they are confident in this, they also need to count BACKWARDS in



these steps. Lots are getting muddled counting back in 2s past the 10s numbers "34, 32, 30, er?" (28!) and/or counting back in 10s "50, 40, 30, **12, 11, 10"**...

In Art this week, the children had a wonderful time drawing objects from nature – focussing carefully on what they could actually see in front of them; trying to form the correct shape overall and adding detail appropriately.

## News from Owl Class (Year 2)

We have all had another busy week in Owl class this week and the children have all enjoyed being able to go on the field at break times, now that the weather has been a little warmer.

In our English lessons, we have continued to look at the features of non-fiction texts. We used our guided reading lessons this week to find out as much as we could about seahorses and we watched some short videos too. We then organised what we had found out, into different groups or sub-headings and collected our research in the form of a research map. This is all helping us to now go on to write our own 'Seahorse Fact Files' and we hope to be able to share some photos of those soon.

In our Maths lessons this week, we have continued working on our statistics unit by focussing on pictograms. The children have interpreted pictograms, drawn their own pictograms and worked on problem solving activities too. They have been learning to always look carefully at the key, in order to see if each picture represents just 1 item or perhaps 2, 5 or 10 items.



## News from Peacock Class (Year 3)

For English this week we continued our work on the traditional tale 'The Man and the Forest'. We have identified and practised the use of inverted commas (speech marks), thought about the descriptive language used and joined in with the repeated phrase in the story. Once we had done all of this, we planned our own section in the style of the traditional tale in groups.

In Maths, we have continued to think about fractions. We have worked on fractions of amounts, finding unit and non-unit fractions of a number. All our fraction thinking was then used to solve



a variety of open-ended tasks where we were encouraged to work systematically to ensure we had found all possible solutions.

In other work, we have found out a little about Celtic tribes and how the land each used forms the boundaries of English counties today. In addition, we wrote a non-chronological report about what early settlers looked for when choosing a location to settle.


We also started our science work on plants and what they need to grow well. We have

set up an investigation to show that plants need light, food and water to grow. We must remember though, that not all plants need the same conditions. If you get a chance to watch the David Attenborough series from a few years ago, 'The Secret Life of Plants' it is fascinating.

In French, we have stated learning phrases to describe where we live and who we live with, we


will move onto the weather with the aim of doing a weather forecast for the country.



### News from Swift Class (Year 4)

In our English lessons we are looking at how we can write for an audience in mind and part of this is knowing when to use formal and informal language where appropriate. We worked on building our vocabulary to write formally – in a way that a customer would write to a company, for example.

The children created their own Swift class golf course as part of our PE lesson as we are lucky to have a class golf set in school. Sport is a great way to learn about resilience. Some children were learning to "bounce back" from a hole that may have taken more shots than expected, to reset and then focus on the next one so they do not let one challenging hole affect the whole round!

Thank you to everyone who has donated offcuts of wools or yarns that you no longer need. This has helped us to create braids that would have been created in the time of the

Vikings. Once they were proficient, the children were quite absorbed in the task in hand - next week we hope to have created a display made from all of our different braids.

## News from Heron Class (Year 5)

Another busy week has seen us continue with our work in Maths on the perimeter and area of different compound shapes. We have also investigated the properties of different 2D and 3D shapes and practised counting backwards through zero in ones and in multiples. We talked about how negative numbers are recorded and where we might see them when we are out and about.

This week in English, we have continued our work on recounts. We have thought about our time at Grafham Water or the time we spent here in school and collected together the key facts that we need to write our own recount. We have also revised adverbials of time, place and number so that we can ensure that these are used consistently in this next piece of writing.

In Science, we have begun a new topic on reversible and irreversible change and have started this by reminding ourselves how some materials change state when they are heated or cooled.

Our 'new' classroom is taking shape and our biomes now house lots of plants and different creatures including some amazing tree frogs (thanks to Harry for his origami skills), rather a lot of snakes and some tadpoles (thank you to Mrs Bowmer for her help, advice and food deliveries

on behalf of the tadpoles) and a painting of 'Spike' the Penguin who you may have seen in the national news!

"In a furious competition that crashed the organiser's website, Spike, a 15-year-old king penguin who lives at Birdland wildlife park in Bourton-on-the-Water, has been voted the world's most popular flightless bird."

We looked at world maps this week to try and remember some of the key geographical language we will need in our new topic, eg, equator, northern and southern hemisphere, latitude, longitude, Tropic of Cancer, Tropic of Capricorn, time zones etc. We were able to tie in some of our Maths learning in spotting how negative numbers are used when recording temperatures and sea levels.

We will soon begin to focus on North America as we have already noticed its huge diversity in terms of climate and other key features of physical geography.

In our P.E. lessons at the moment we are working on striking and fielding, particular key skills needed when playing Kwik Cricket and Rounders.



We have also started to learn about Hinduism in R.E. and made a start by considering what we already know about this religion and what we would like to find out.




### News from Puffin Class (Year 6)

With the SATs tests looming on the near horizon, we have been working very hard in lessons. We have focussed on the four operations and fractions in particular, please reinforce this at home. Look at the information below about dividing fractions (this also explains how to multiply fraction too) to help you and your child at home.

We have also worked at SPAG related questions and reading comprehensions this week, as well. With just over a week to go, the children have been putting in a lot of effort – well done to all – keep it up, we are nearly there!

In English, we have finished our topic on fables, based on Aesop. We looked at Aesop himself; ask your



children about his life and death. We recapped on the use of speech marks (inverted commas) in fictional work and studied various morals that are still used today – some of which the children included in their own fable.

This week, in Maths, we have looked at position and direction before continuing with area, perimeter and volume. Our final focus for the Year 6 curriculum will be on the topics of statistics and average, before we study different exam techniques in the final few days in the lead up to the SATs exams commencing on the week from the 8th May.


