Message from Mrs How:

We all know that homework is a contentious issue in primary schools. Whatever we do, some parents always want more and some parents always want less.

There is so much to fit into the school curriculum that there is rarely time to give children the opportunities to practice many of the key skills that are taught. This is where we rely on support from home.

If you are able to spend just 10/15 minutes a day on the following activities (you could pick one a day) it makes a huge difference to your child's confidence and progress.

Weekly expectations for parents/carers to support children in rehearsal and fluency

- Reading and phonics (aim for 4 times a week) and record in the reading diary, please
- Spellings (this is Spellingframe for the majority of children, some may have something slightly different))
- Mathletics and Tackling Tables (Y2 upwards)

Additional/Optional tasks which can enhance children's learning and deepen their understanding

We often have parents asking for advice or suggestions for activities that could further enhance their children's learning. While it is not possible to set individualised homework on a regular basis, we are going to trial a process where class teachers will send out a grid of possible activities tied in with the current class topic. These will give you and your children opportunities to investigate, visit or create something that works for you as a family, if you wish. **These are entirely optional – if time is limited please prioritise the practice activities above.** A date will be given when children will be able to share their learning from any of these ptional activities in class.

Parking at school drop off and pick up times

News from Starling Class (Reception)

Welcome back from Starling Class!

The children have hit the ground running with their learning this week and we have seen an increase in their confidence with their knowledge, so thank you for your support over half term in keeping their love of learning alive!



This week we have looked at the country of Mexico and discussed how different Mexico City is to Steeple Morden, using Google Earth to help us visualise the two settings. We noticed that there are a lot of roads and buildings with some houses having swimming pools in Mexico City whereas there was a lot of greenery in Steeple Morden! Our Geography work was linked to our Artist of the moment Frida Kahlo, we will be looking at some of her pieces and using them to inspire our own self-portraits over the coming weeks.

In Phonics this week, the children have learnt 6 new graphemes (4 new phonemes) h, b, f, ff, l and ll. In Maths this week, we used our 3D shape knowledge from last half term to support our 2D shape work. The children have been thinking about the properties of 2D shapes using Mathematical vocabulary such as straight, curved and edge in addition to

finding odd ones out using their knowledge of the properties of shapes to make decisions. In RE this week, we started our work on answering the big question 'Why do Christians perform Nativity plays at Christmas?' The children looked at different costumes, discussed which one they would choose to wear and why, and tried to decide which costume was most important (very tricky!).






Assemblies, Collective Worship and Reflection

We have begun the half term with an introduction to Goldilocks. Thankfully, most of the children know the story really well, so we could get down to the business of naming characters, ordering pictures, using some super language and getting to grips with the names. Considering the fact that all of the children know the trigraph 'ear' (as in ear) it was fun to talk to them about Daddy B-ear (beer) We got to know quite a lot about some Daddies out there!!!

We have continued our work on the countries of the UK by starting our 'fact files' with England. It sounded like a few of you had listened to the song in the last Star (here is the link again, just in case! <u>https://tinyurl.com/3vzushnz</u>). We will be adding to this with the rest

of the countries over

Having assessed the children with their phonics last term, I have taken one more week to consolidate the graphemes they have already been taught. We are aware that quite a few children are not yet secure with these, so if you can please practise looking at them every day, this would really benefit your child. Next week we will be learning some new graphemes!



In Maths we have been impressed with the children's knowledge and memory about

part-whole models from when they were in Reception (top marks, Mrs Meridew!) and have started looking at the + and = symbols. We have impressed upon the children that = or 'equals' means 'is the same as' (rather than "it's the biggest number next" or that "it comes near the end of the sentence"!) We will be dispelling some of these myths and will move on to subtractions at some point...!!



As mentioned at Parents Evenings, we will be encouraging the children to make sure they can read the following words on sight, following by trying to get the children to learn to spell them.

the, a, said, was, is, his, they, he, she, my, here, house, our

We will look at them in class, and I will let you know what we have covered in each particular week here. This week, we looked at spelling the word 'said'.

Thank you for sending PE kits back to school so promptly – it is much appreciated. If you know you are one of the last 2 or 3, please make sure it is with us on Monday morning ready for our next PE lesson.

In D&T this half term, the children will be learning different ways to join paper to paper. From next week, it might be a suitable question to ask on a Wednesday to see if they can explain what they have learned, or even better, show you!

In Science, the children did a great job of sorting pictures of animals, with direction, starting with mammals, then adding in birds, fish, reptiles, amphibians and insects. We did talk about insects being a subgroup of a more general 'minibeasts', but the pictures were all of insects!




News from Owl Class (Year 2)

The children have returned from half term well rested and keen to learn. It has been a busy first week back but everyone has settled back into routine smoothly. This week we have been working hard recapping our learning from last term and using our knowledge to investigate further. In our Maths lessons, we have been using our number bonds to 10 to add to the next ten and subtract from a ten.

I know 3 + 7 =2 + 6 = 3060 - 7 = 5310; therefore I40 + 3 = 5030 - 9 = 21know 73 + 7 =9 + 10 = 2050 - 2 = 4880.70 = 6 + 6670 - 1 = 69

In our Topic work this week we have been busy making food chains and looking at what animals eat and why.





We have also started looking at our Henri Rousseau art project, inspired by his painting entitled 'Tiger in a Tropical Storm'. We looked at the techniques used by the artist and started to create our own backgrounds.





In English this week, we have looked at the features of a recount. The children have also looked at the past tense word ending – *ed* in their phonics and spelling work and how this can vary in pronunciation, e.g. *asked*, *listened* and *landed* all end the same but sound different.

Features of a recount:
Who? Where? When?
Past tense verbs: went, walked
Time connectives: First, Next, Then, Finally

In PE this week the children really enjoyed starting to play hockey and using the wooden hockey sticks for the first time. It was trickier than first thought and Miss Blesic did slip causing great eruptions of laughter, but by the end of the lesson everyone could hold the hockey stick and dribble the ball.

News from Peacock Class (Year 3)

A jolly week in Year Three, the children are all refreshed from their half term week and have been eager to learn.

In English, this week we have started to look at the descriptive work in 'Charlie and the



Chocolate Factory'. So far, we have reminded ourselves what nouns and adjectives are and how they can be used in a descriptive sentence. We then worked together to gather adjectives and descriptive phrases to describe the factory. We have saved all of our ideas and suggestions for use in future lessons. The descriptive work based on this story will continue for the next couple of weeks.

In Maths, we have started to think about subtraction by subtracting a single digit number where the subtraction bridges a 10. This introduced how to exchange 1 ten for 10 ones. We than thought about how to subtract a multiple of 10 from a 3-digit number, including where we have to exchange 1 hundred for 10 tens.

In other areas, we have started our next unit of science all about light. In this, we needed to consider how we use light to see and how shadows are formed. There were many activities

enjoyed to cover this work; feely bags to prove we need light to see, shadow hand puppets to show that shadows are made when an object blocks the light, a bingo quiz to learn scientific facts about light, a word search to learn key vocabulary and sorted light sources from reflectors. We made 'fortune tellers' to test each other on our knowledge. We will continue with our work about the science of light next week.

> In PE, on Friday, we were introduced to skills that could be used in a game of Hockey. Many of the things we had thought about in our tennis work were useful, nifty footwork, hand eye coordination and ball control.





In French, we greeted each other, asking how we each were before we revised our numbers to 10 and learned 11 and 12. We then started to learn some of the colours; we will build on this so that we can use the colours as adjectives for some common objects, eg. the red apple.

With Miss Smith, we moved to the New Testament and thought about how Jesus chose his first disciples.

We even managed a 'spot the signs of Autumn 'walk, please see class web page for pictures.

News from Swift Class (Year 4)

In our English lessons, we are writing explanation texts and exploring the features associated with this such as paragraphing, sub-headings and colons and using these skills when writing in other subjects. Pointing these features out in the texts children read can be helpful as can finding examples of where 'topic sentences' are particularly effective. A topic sentence is a name for the first sentence of a paragraph that introduces the content of the paragraph. If a piece has been constructed well, it should be possible just to read the first sentence of each paragraph and understand the gist of the whole piece.

This week in our Maths lessons, we have begun to explore the concept of area and the units involved. After children have become proficient with area, we will help them recognise how this is different from perimeter as they can get these concepts confused.

Some of the work we have covered in art lessons this term is based on drawing figures. We are now looking at some of the work of a contemporary British artist, Lynette Yiadom-Boakye. She will have an exhibition of her work at the Tate Britain from 24th November to 26th February 2023. We have been looking in detail at the muted colour palette which she uses in her work. By using differing amounts of paint and experimenting, we have made a variety of tones and will use this palate to create art work of our own.

And the children and a cupele of soil

We will start to think about Christmas decorations, which feels incredibly early, but the Church's Christmas Tree festival is taking place mid-November as there's lots going on at church in December.

News from Heron Class (Year 5)

Welcome back after what was hopefully a restful and enjoyable half term break for you all.

We have jumped straight back into the learning and in Maths we have carried on our work on addition and subtraction that we started before the half term break. We have spent time this week solving problems and trying to choose the most efficient method



to reason out solutions to our problems. We looked at examples that we could work out mentally and then examples where we might need written methods such as column addition or subtraction. Mathletics will have some activities set this week to fine tune our skills!

In English, we have started to look at a new genre – letters. We spent some time this week reading letters to and from famous people. We read a letter from Queen Elizabeth to President Eisenhower where she shared her drop scones recipe with him, one from Roald Dahl to one of his fans and finally letters that Victorian mothers had written that they left with their children when they had to give them up on the steps of the Foundling Hospital in Victorian London. We will be writing letters of our own soon, delivering them and hoping for a reply.

In Italian, we had a very enjoyable lesson playing bingo with numbers in Italian up to 100. If you have a minute, perhaps ask your child if they can remember how to say any of these numbers in Italian as some of them really do sound quite spectacular!

In our Art lessons this week we continued to be inspired by the work of William Morris and created our own designs which we have begun to imprint on tiles. In our next lesson we will be completing these and then printing with rollers and printing inks. The class have worked really carefully on their designs and we think you will be impressed with the final results.

We had a number of children without a full PE kit for our lesson on Wednesday. Please could you ensure that your child has a pair of shorts, t-shirt, jogging bottoms, socks and trainers and the kit is labelled in a PE bag. Ideally, stud earrings need to be removed on PE days as this would save time taping several ears. Please can long hair be tied back at home before the children come into school. Thank you for your help with this as we would like to maximise



our time outside doing PE.

You should have received a spelling letter in your child's bag today. If it hasn't appeared yet, please have a little rummage for it in their schoolbag.



News from Puffin Class (Year 6)

I hope that you all had a restful holiday last week and are gearing up for the lead up to Christmas now!

This week, in Maths, we have been continuing to look at division. The children have been working on short and long division. Please look at the attached example of long division and ask your child to explain how to work through the stages of the question. Again, I must emphasise how important it is for your child to learn their times tables. As well as examining these formal methods, we have developed our reasoning skills when



studying worded problems involving division. For example, division is also about multiplication, addition, subtraction, place value, fractions etc.

In English, we have started to plan and write our 'hot texts' for a balanced argument. We have focussed on the language found in the genre (sentence openers, conjunctions, complex sentences) and have looked at various examples, from subjects ranging from should dogs be banned from parks through to should pupils be allowed mobile phones in school, among many others.

In PE, this term, we will be playing hockey and rugby on the field. Please, therefore, could your child bring in a PE kit that they do not mind getting dirty if the weather deteriorates over the next few weeks. Thank you.

Homework will be set this Friday and should be completed by Thursday 10th November. Keep on reading and learning those times tables, please.
